KENTUCKY ISSUES STATEWIDE HEALTH ALERT

One McGreary Countian infected and hospitalized due to mosquito-borne West Nile Virus

The Kentucky Department for Public Health issued a statewide health alert on Thursday (October 2, 2025) due to this year's increase in West Nile Virus (WNV) and other mosquito-borne illness-

es (La Crosse virus) throughout the state. The alert advises Kentucky residents to take precautions against the virus, which is spread through mosquito bites, such as using mosquito repellent, wearing protective clothing (long sleeves and socks), ensuring that doors and windows have screens, using air-conditioning instead of opening windows, having mosquito nets over beds, and eliminating/turning over/ covering sources of standing water such as flowerpots, gutters, and the like. Repellants should contain ingredients such as DEET, picaridin, or oil of lemon eucalyptus (a natural ingredient).

Thus far, the state has reported 19 WNV cases, including one from McCreary County, which represents a notable increase over the average of seven cases in previous years. Of the 19 cases, there has been one confirmed death in Daviess County.

Seven counties across the state have reported confirmed cases of WNV, including McCreary, Anderson, Daviess, Franklin, and Henderson Counties. Additionally, Jefferson and Fayette Counties (notably Louisville

Fall fire season has begun

Outdoor burning is restricted through December 15

Kentucky's fall fire season began on October 1 and continues through December 15. As humidity decreases and leaves change color, they fall to the ground, making the forest floor dry and ready for fires. Because of this, it is illegal to burn anything within 150 feet of woodland or brushland between 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. during the fall fire season. Outdoor burning is only allowed between
