Meredith gets Senate nod to become the next Kentucky federal judge

Chad Meredith will be Kentucky's new-

est federal district judge. After being tapped by President Donald Trump over the summer, Meredith passed the last trial of the judicial nomination process Thursday afternoon: full U.S. Senate

Meredith was confirmed to join the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky in a 48-45 vote by the Senate, which is controlled by a Republican majority. He will fill the seat of Judge Danny Reeves, who took senior status earlier this year. Meredith is currently employed at the Cincinnati-based law firm Squire Patton

The path Meredith took to the post was not without its bumps.

Three years ago, Meredith was slated to be nominated by former Democratic President Joe Biden in a rare deal between Biden and Kentucky GOP Sen. Mitch McConnell. The plan was dropped, however, due to the opposition of Kentucky Sen.

This time around, Paul supported McConnell's nomination of Meredith.

Meredith faced some moderately oppositional questioning from Democrats in his Senate Judiciary Committee hearing. Those questions centered around his views on abortion and his time in the office of former Gov. Matt Bevin. Though Bevin's team carried out a number of highly controversial pardons, Meredith maintained he was not involved.

McConnell lauded Meredith's confirmation in a statement.

"Chad's impressive legal background in the private sector and devotion to serving the public make him an excellent addition to the federal bench. His thoughtfulness and commitment to our Constitution will serve him well as he carries out his new

Before entering private practice, Meredith clerked for Senior Justice John Marshall Rogers on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit and for Amul Thapar in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky before Thapar was appointed to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit. Both of those judges were first appointed to the bench by former President George W. Bush.

In a statement, Kentucky Senate GOP leadership called Meredith "one of Kentucky's finest legal sons."

His father is Stephen Meredith, R-Leitchfield, a longtime member of the Senate GOP caucus.

"This is a momentous occasion for Kentucky and a proud milestone for the Meredith family. Chad Meredith's distinguished legal career, steadfast commitment to constitutional principles, and unwavering integrity have earned him broad respect across the legal community. His confirmation not only recognizes his impressive qualifications but also affirms the importance of judicial restraint and constitutional fidelity," Kentucky Senate GOP wrote in the state-

LEXINGTON — The daughter of a former county sheriff charged with killing a judge last year took to social media this week to deny rumors the judge had an inappropriate relationship with her.

Lila Stines posted a pair of TikTok videos Oct. 21 and Oct. 22 urging people not to spread the rumor and claiming that any stories about her and "the other party" were made up.

"Do you all not have anything bet-

ter to do than to sit and gossip?" she said. "You are taking my pain, and making it your pleasure. You're taking our stories and turning them into big entertainment pieces, jokes, and for that matter, you're making it your income. Since when did that become okay?"

The videos come after Lila Stines, who is now 18 but was a minor when the shooting happened, and her

that she had any contact with former Letcher County Judge Kevin Mullins, according to grand jury transcripts.

Her father, former Letcher County Sheriff Shawn "Mickey" Stines, 44, is accused of shooting and killing Mullins inside the judge's chambers on Sept. 19, 2024. The shooting was captured on video, and the motive for the shooting has remained a mystery.

Mickey Stines is charged with mur-

der, and his case is pending. His lawyer, Jeremy Bartley, has claimed his client was under extreme emotional duress at the time of the shooting, and he said he planned to use an insanity defense.

The case garnered national attention, including from true crime personalities on social media, who claimed the judge had an inappropriate relationship with Mickey Stines' minor daughter.

Clayton Stamper, a detective with Kentucky State Police, testified that the sheriff used Mullins' phone to call his daughter before the shoot-

ing. In video footage of the shooting, Mickey Stines appears to ask for Mullins' phone and make a call on it.

But Stamper said there was no evidence of previous communication between Mullins and the daughter, including through social media, texts or phone calls, according to grand jury transcripts.

Lila Stines' videos this week went viral. increasing her follower mother also denied to investigators count from about 950 to more than

7,000. She clarified in a second video that she wasn't addressing the shooting specifically, only the rumors about a relationship with Mullins.

"I am aware of how serious this is and how much of a big deal this is,' Stines said. "I was not talking about news or social media; I was simply talking about the people who sit at home, behind a keyboard all day and say terrible things about my name.'

Revised fluoride bill in the works for 2026

FRANKFORT — Two Kentucky lawmakers are hoping 2026 will be the year a bill to remove the state mandate for fluoride in Kentucky's drinking water crosses the finish line.

Rep. Mark Hart, R-Falmouth, has filed legislation cerns we heard was they similar to House Bill 16 from the 2025 legislative session nine times, he said. The bill did not become law this year, but did receive House approval.

On Tuesday, Hart was joined by Sen. Greg Elkins, R-Winchester, and other stakeholders at the Interim Joint Committee on State Government meeting to testify on a new version of HB

Hart plans to carry the bill in the House, and Elkins said he would file companion legislation in the Senate next year.

"The legislation simply undoes the unfunded mandate in the state of Kentucky that requires water producers to add fluoride to the water," Hart said. The newer version of the

legislation from Hart would protect local water districts from civil and criminal liability, he said. The decision to add this provision to the bill is the result of conversations with water districts.

"One of the biggest conwere worried about possible litigation," Hart said. "Doesn't matter whether they keep fluoride in water or take it out, they are afraid they're going to be sued with whatever decision is made."

Dr. Jack Kall, a dentist and the executive chair of the International Academy of Oral Medicine and Toxicology, shared scientific studies with the committee that show water fluoridation might cause lower IQ in children, among other

health concerns. Kall said the fluoride in most toothpaste and other fluoride treatments administered by dentists are sufficient in preventing tooth

Hart said his legislation is an effort to make water fluoridation a local decision in light of newer studies on the risks and benefits of water fluoridation.

"We're not promoting fluoride one way or another good or bad," Hart said. "We're trying to steer away from that conversation, because that's not what the legislation does. However, with some of the stuff in the media today, we thought it was necessary to give you a little bit of an education on the risks and benefits for it."

Elkins said he considers the proposed legislation to be "permissive" rather than a requirement.
