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Council approves budget, keeps same property tax rates

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The Middlesboro City Council approved the first reading of the budget ordinance for fiscal year running from July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2026 during Tuesday's regular meeting. They also approved the ad valorem tax levies, keeping the rates the same at 23.20 cents per \$100 of assessed value on personal property and 6.90 cents Department, \$798,000 for the present at Tuesday's meeting. The Petie Gilbert shared that new per \$100 of assessed value on real property.

\$18,494,000 in total revenue and \$18,158,750 in total expenditures during the upcoming fiscal year. It includes \$1,038,000 for administrative expenses, \$2,342,000 for the Police Department, \$2,128,500 for the Fire Department, \$2,064,000 for Ambulance Service, \$3,011,500 for the Sewer

Street Department, \$573,000 for budget's first reading and both Parks & Recreation, \$185,500 for property tax levy ordinances were The city's budget projects the Pool, \$532,000 for the ABC Fund and \$945,000 for the Sanitation Fund and another \$3,950,750 for general items.

> Included in the budget is the annual 1-percent raise for all city employees which takes effect each November.

> Council members Brad Cawood and Bill Smith were not

approved unanimously.

The real property tax ordinance also includes a 0.025% bank franchise and local deposit tax. There is a 2% discount for tax bills paid in full by November. There is a 5% penalty on taxes not paid before January and a 21% penalty on taxes not paid before February.

During his report Police Chief

MPD officer TJ Patterson has successfully completed his field training and is now working a night rotation. Jacob Quillen is two months from being certified as a K-9 handler.

Gilbert told the council his department was currently short on police officers and in the process of trying to get more.

t approximately 12:40 p.m. June 18, 2025, the Kentucky State Police received a request for assistance from the Middlesboro Police Department regarding multiple individuals injured during a vehicle pursuit that ended in a collision.



The incident took place near South 35th Street and Exeter Avenue in Middlesboro.

According to a release from the KSP, Middlesboro officers were actively pursuing Jason Bullins, who had active parole and burglary warrants. Mr. Bullins fled from law enforcement after initial contact.

During the pursuit, a Middlesboro Police Sgt. Jeremiah Johnson and the operator of the fleeing vehicle (Mr. Bullins) were injured. Both were transported by ambulance to Middlesboro ARH for medical treatment.

The Kentucky State Police is leading the investigation into the collision, while the Middlesboro Police Department is handling the criminal investigation.

After being released from the hospital, Jason Bullins was lodged in the Bell County Detention Center charged with fleeing or evading police - 1st degree (motor vehicle), wanton endangerment - 1st degree, wanton endangerment - 1st degree (police officer), assault -3rd degree (police officer), buying/possessing drug paraphernalia, possession of controlled substance - 1st offense (Methamphetamine). He was also served with burglary - 2nd degree and parole violation warrants.
