The win wouldn't have been possible without the sterling play of senior point guard Chucky Hepburn, who led all scorers with 26 points, also was the leader in assists with seven and scored seven of his team's final 13 points, all on free throws.

In all, he was fouled 11 times and made 16-of-20 foul shots in addition to 5-of-8 field goal attempts while committing only two turnovers.

Reyne Smith scored 17 points and hit all but two of Louisville's six 3-pointers, including a dagger that gave the Cards some much-needed breathing room in the final two minutes. Subtract Smith's 4-of-10 and his teammates were 2-of-16 from distance.

Terrence Edwards Jr. regained his starting spot and celebrated by making the evening miserable for UNC star RJ Davis, who was limited to 12 points on 4-of-14 shooting. Kelsey didn't mind that Edwards misplaced his shooting eye,

hitting just 2-of-12.

And there was James Scott, who had 11 points, eight rebounds and a big block at crunch time.

"It was a heck of a win," Kelsey said. "Obviously, Carolina is extremely talented, as good of a downhill transition attacking team as there is in America. Maybe the best. It was probably our best defensive effort of the year."

Hepburn would have normally guarded Davis, but at 6-foot-2, he was only two inches taller. Edwards is 6-6.

"Edwards' defensive

effort was outstanding," Kelsey said. "He guarded (Davis) the majority of the time and he's a terrific player. We decided we needed to go with a little more size and length and he really accepted the challenge. He was excited about it. That dude was locked in."

UNC coach Hubert Davis noted it wasn't only Edwards who was locked in.

"They were very physical, they really jammed us up," said Davis, whose team was without starting point guard Seth Trimble, who is

reportedly under concussion protocol. Ian Jackson led the Heels with 23 points.

U of L was clinging to a 70-69 lead heading into the final three minutes, but reeled off 12 points in a row to put the game out of reach. Besides Hepburn's foul shots and Smith's trey that made it 76-69, the other two points were provided by James Scott's dunk on a pass from Hepburn.

"Closing out games, we call the last eight minutes winning time," Kelsey said. "Shortly

before that, a lot of things were going wrong and the guys walked toward the huddle with their dobbers down a little bit. But they rallied and they were terrific down the stretch. You have to close out games with stops and rebounds, and that's what we were able to do. The guys just dug in with ripping defensive stops toward the end."

Now the Cards have a chance to win three conference games in a row for the first time since early in the 2022 season when they travel Saturday to Virginia.

The Trojans have averaged 82.8 points a game during the win streak, while the Bruins, who lost in the final of the City of Middletown Holiday Classic last weekend, are averaging 73.2 points per game on the season.

Central Hardin is averaging 59.7 points a game in its three losses.

"It's about taking one district game at a time and getting better from those games for down the road," Central Hardin head coach Tavon Johnson said. "Of course it's important to win, but I think it's also important to learn from these games and use these games to formulate game plans to help within the district tournament."

The Bruins have defeated John Hardin (74-69) and Elizabethtown (60-53), while the Trojans have wins over Fort Knox (83-53) and John Hardin (79-53).

Elizabethtown is 2-1 in district play, while John Hardin is 1-3 and Fort Knox is 0-3. The second games between teams serve as a tie-breaker in district play.

"Central has played well this season, they have solid guards who shoot the ball well. They are a team who uses their guard play to score and we have to limit that," Baffour said. "We will play our brand of basketball and that starts on the defensive end. When you impose your will on that end, offense becomes easy because you get to play in transition. We are very adaptable to any type of defense thrown at us so offensively we have to be smart and force them to guard."

Junior Camdyn Hogan leads the Bruins' scoring attack at 21.1 points a game. Junior Carson Nichols averages 18.4 points and a team-high 6.8 rebounds, while senior Cameron Elmore averages 15.2 points.

Hogan is shooting 37.5% on 3-pointers and Elmore 37.1%. They have combined for 51 of Central Hardin's 93 made 3-pointers on the season.

The Trojans have a scoring attack that features six players averaging between 9.3 points and 13.4 points a game. Senior Miklos Melton Jr. leads the way with 13.4 points a game and senior Caleb Huff is at 11.2 a game.

Seniors Jaydin Vornberger and Tyree John are at 9.9 points a game, while senior Zekeriyya Mackey is at 9.8 points a game and senior Seth Woods is at 9.3 a game.

Vornberger is averaging 17 points a game over his last four games

and was named the MVP of the Swauger Holiday Classic. He's also made 11 of his last 18 3-point attempts.

"North has several players that can lead them on any night which makes them difficult to defend because you can't lock in on stopping one or two guys because they have others that can hurt you," Johnson said.

"Melton is their guy who is a really good player. They also have Mackey in the middle who has showed improvement this season. Caleb Huff and Tyree John are guys who can affect the game with their size and scortring abilities.

"Seth Woods is a guy who affects the game with his athleticism and energy," he added.

"(Vornberger) is also playing really well lately for them over the Christmas break."

Mackey leads the team in rebounding at 8.4 a game.

Four of North Hardin's next five games are district games, while five

of Central Hardin's next seven games are district matchups.

Notice is hereby given that a public hearing as required by Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code") will be held telephonically at 10:00 a.m. Eastern Standard Time on January 10, 2025 by the Kentucky Bond Development Corporation (the "Issuer"), concerning the proposed issuance, in one or more series or sub-series, by the Issuer, for the benefit of Baptist Healthcare System, Inc. ("Baptist Health"), a Kentucky not-for-profit corporation and an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Code, of up to \$500,000,000 aggregate principal amount of the Issuer's Hospital Revenue Bonds, City of Williamsburg, Series 2025 (Baptist Healthcare System Obligated Group) (the "Bonds"), pursuant to a resolution or resolutions of the Issuer.

The proceeds of the Bonds in the respective maximum principal amounts set forth below will be used by Baptist Health for financing, refinancing, or reimbursing a portion of the costs of the purchase, acquisition, construction, enlargement, remodeling, renovation, improvement, furnishing or equipping of the hospitals, other health facilities and their related facilities, including land, owned or operated by Baptist Health or Baptist Health Medical Group ("BHMG"), an affiliate of Baptist Health and an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Code, and generally located at the locations, all as described below:
