More than 3.500 students come from sea duty and shore to attend basic recruiting courses and receive a good dose of public speaking classes to develop communications skills that will help them not just in recruiting but throughout their Naval careers. Students must demonstrate what they learn in the classroom with prepared speeches and perform in a simulated sales environment, where they must help an applicant make an informed, mutually beneficial decision to join the Navy. These steps are critical to ensuring that prospective applicants fully understand what naval service entails and that the Navy receives highly motivated and committed officers and enlisted sailors to serve.

Marlin has many opportunities to achieve accomplishments during a civil service career.

"I'm thankful to have this job," Marlin said. "I'm learning a lot of new skills and enjoy working here."

One Elizabethtown child was chosen by Breakthrough T1D, the leading global type 1 diabetes research and advocacy organization, to join a delegation of their peers and celebrity advocates in Washington, D.C., this summer at Breakthrough T1D 2025 Children's Congress from July 7-9.
