First Baptist Youth Minister Jay Montgomery explained that, Poindexter initially had some help the first couple of weeks after the tornado but then everything had been at a standstill the last six months. “She needed the hard work people really didn’t want to give time to and students did,” Montgomery said.

The students recognized

that Poindexter was deeply grateful for their help. “We prayed for her multiple times and she was open to that,” Lydia said. “It was nice she was open to our help.” The students also appreciated the chance to share the love of Jesus through their actions and noted the woman connected the gospel to her rehabilitation program.

By the end of the trip, the youth had helped care not just for a person, but for a few animals, including opossums, sugar gliders and

turtles. Eventually, deer and bats will return to the wildlife rehabilitation center once new fencing and shelters are rebuilt.

This mission trip was a changing experience for many of the students. “I thought I was doing a good deed and helping out. Helping really made an impact on me and I would do it again,” added CCHS junior Tristan Curry.

Shelby agreed: “That was my first real mission trip. It was really special to me. Mission trips are about the

mindset and what it means for you as a Christian, how it helps you grow in your faith.”

The group stayed one night in London and worked from the moment they arrived until the moment they had to leave, even choosing to stay a little longer than originally planned. “I was sad we only stayed one night. I wish we could have done more,” Shelby said.

The experience has inspired the students to look ahead to future opportunities. Longtime mission volunteer

and Carrollton business owner Dennis Raisor traveled with them and encouraged the teens to continue serving. “He poured a lot into us,” Shelby said. “It opened my mind to being a model of faith for the younger people.”

As Lydia put it, “People hear during fall break you’re going to dig up rocks, but once you go and experience it, it was really rewarding and it didn’t even feel like work.”

In the end, what began as an uncertain, single-project

mission became a powerful lesson in selfless service and Christian compassion that will have a lasting impact on the students.

-launch at a Wildlife Management Area (WMA) boat ramp is not a commercial activity under the current WMA regulations. Also, amend 301 KAR 3:001 – Definitions for 301 KAR Chapter 3 to define commercial activity and modify the group definition.

- Amend 301 KAR 2:178

- Deer hunting on public properties to modify deer hunting regulations to allow hunting on properties owned by county or local governments to include wildlife management areas, state parks, other public lands and federally controlled areas.

- Amend 301 KAR 4:090

- Taxidermy and the buying

and selling of inedible wildlife parts to incorporate by reference applications and reporting forms for Resident Fur Buyer, Resident Fur Processor, Non-Resident Fur Buyer, and Non-Resident 3-Day Fur Buyer licenses.

- Amend 301 KAR 5:210

- Special agency fundraising permits to update the special fundraising permits drawing regulation to modify definitions and re-order permit drawing sequence. Also, amend 301 KAR 5:022 – License, tag, registration, and permit fees for conformity.

- Consider commission member request to allow for the formation of a limited number of Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission committees.

Several Discussion Items and New Business Items will also be presented, but action

on those items is anticipated at future meetings of the commission.

His last two seasons had records of 4-8 and 5-7 leading to the termination.


“Will Stein brings two invaluable qualities to the table as the next head coach of the UK football program,” University of Kentucky President Eli Capilouto said. “He is an outstanding developer and coach of young talent, something he has proven

repeatedly in his career already as a quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator at an elite level. And he has a deep and abiding passion for this place. It runs deep with him and his family.

“He understands the Big Blue Nation, this university and what this team and program mean to our commonwealth. We are looking forward to welcoming Will and his family back home and we can’t wait to support them as they further elevate our program in a way that makes Kentucky proud.”

Stein’s Heisman finalists, quarterbacks Bo Nix and Dillon Gabriel, have gone on to start multiple games in the NFL in their rookie years as well.

The hiring of the offensive-minded Stein may help Kentucky keep redshirt freshman quarterback Cutter Boley in the fold, along with other young playmakers on the roster. He will need to have some quick conversations with the UK players. They can enter the transfer portal beginning five days after the hire is finalized.
