At the court's request, as brought up by Magistrate Stephanie Hawkins, JAMP Enterprises LLC Architect and Developer of the project Adam McIntyre agreed to a binding element to ensure no alcohol advertising will be visible from the exterior of the building.

In regard to pedestrians attempting to cross Highway 393, Swansburg mentioned that — according to state law — pedestrians crossing a roadway without using a crosswalk must yield right-of-way to all vehicles or be subjected to a \$20 to \$100 fine. Further, the design offers a significant amount of parking, dissuading attendees to park elsewhere and walk to the

Swansburg also noted that the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet advises to discourage pedestrian crossings with fencing or signage if the roadway isn't designed for them. Hawkins proposed adding fencing, but other magistrates doubted its effectiveness, and McIntyre added that there wasn't enough space.

In regard to concerns about traffic, Swansburg told the court that JAMP had extensive discussions with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet prior to approval by the Oldham County Planning Commission, and that the cabinet ultimately raised no objec-
