until EMS arrived, the man survived and walked out of the hospital with no brain injury.
Whittaker honored the individuals who were part of the rescue operation.
"It couldn't have hap-

pened without training and the grace of God," said Whittaker.
He said all the staff is trained in CPR and in the AED units in the jail. Working along side the EMS, the man was taken to the hospital. It took responders 33 minutes before the victim was breathing again.
To honor those who were

part of the rescue, Whittaker presented Life Saver Awards to his staff, dispatchers and EMS personnel during a recent meeting of Bullitt Fiscal Court.
Those honored with the Life Saver Awards included: Dispatchers – Derrick Hammond, Kaileigh Nida and Alisha Gilbert
Detention Center Staff – LPN Coby Thomas, Sgt. Julie

M. Honeycutt, Mickayla G. Burnstein, David Willett, Natalie S. Harden, Jeffrey Moore and Ethan C. Ried
EMS personnel – paramedic Brendan White, and EMTs Nicole Logsdon and Ally McCaslin.
Prior to those awards, Whittaker honored past jailers. State Rep. Peyton Griffiee also honored each with kind words from

Frankfort.
Billy Roy Shepherd was given his retirement badge for service from 1970-86. The late Ralph Bleemel served from 1986-97 and Tim Seng filled out the remainder of Bleemel's term.
Danny Fackler served as jailer from 1999 through 2010 with Martha Knox being the director from 2011-18.
The late Paul Watkins

would serve three years before his passing led to the appointment of Whittaker, who would then win a four-year term.
Whittaker said he felt it was important to recognize those who served in the jailer's role for so many years.
Also recognized was Lt. Courtney D. Crosby for her 20 years of service with the detention center.

to move forward with getting a survey done on the area. Then an engineer would be secured and bids let out.
The city intends to use

federal ARPA funds to cover the cost of the project.
*The council set its tax rates for the year.
The real property tax will be significantly lowered from 9.18 cents per \$100 of assessed property to 7.77 cents. If you have a home assessed at \$100,000, the current tax of

\$91.80 to \$77.70 this year.
City attorney Mark Edison said that there would be no recall on the ballot as the city stayed below the rate of 7.77 cents so no public hearing was required.
The personal property rate would remain the same at 15.76 cents per \$100 of

assessed property.
And the public service rate would be a level 16 cents.
There was no opposition to any of the tax rates.
*A constant problem remains what should be the city do to the common area.
Councilman David Lotze said he would've to see some

things like picnic tables and a walking path on the property owned by the city.
Israel said he understood the suggestion but vandalism in the past as been an issue.
There was discussion about adding more lighting on the city's property. Salt River Electric will be consulted to

see the cost of adding the lights.
ARPA projects must be completed by Dec. 31, 2026.
