The Amputation Of Grief

In his classic, "A Grief Observed," theologian C.S. Lewis offered candid and personal reflections on the death of a loved one, his wife, Joy. Lewis described the death of a loved one: "The death of a beloved is an amputation." Imagine losing a limb late in life. You have to learn how to live all over again. This is grief. The limb is never coming back and yet life goes on. How do you cope?

Lewis' thoughts and writings on this subject came to my mind immediately (this past week) when I saw the news of the horrible air collision in Washington, D.C. 67 lives vanished the moment the Army Blackhawk helicopter and American Airlines flight #5342 collided. It was less than the time to toast bread or text a friend. In one fleeting moment, 67 families were shaken to the core in a horrible tragedy.

As of this writing, just over 40 bodies have been recovered from the frigid, Potomac River. Over 50 divers have been on the scene searching the watery grave for lost loved ones and evidence. The NTSB, U.S. Army, FAA, local fire departments, and other experienced professionals are gathering as much evidence and data as possible. It will take time to get the right answers in what appears to be a series of mistakes. However, we need to leave the answers to the experts.

Grief is difficult under normal circumstances. Imagine grieving a loved one on a global stage. The victims are all over news outlets and social media around the world. The surviving families must grieve with the additional weight of a front page or lead story proportions. They cannot escape the public eye for much-needed privacy and solace. I cannot imagine what they are thinking or experiencing. Only those who've experienced a similar loss can begin to relate.

As a Christ-follower my mind runs to scripture for answers and comfort when bad things happen to good people. Three passages came to my mind as I thought about the families left behind:

Matthew 5:4 - Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

Psalm 147:3 - He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their woun ds.

Psalm 34:18 - The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit.

I hope they know they are not alone. To those who've lost a spouse, father, mother, sister, brother, daughter, son, uncle, aunt, niece, or nephew may the God of all comfort smother you in grace. May you be reunited with your loved one. May you feel the collective mourning of our nation on your behalf. May you sense the peace of God despite the chaos and noise.

There are no easy answers. I cannot explain this or other tragedies. But I trust God and the Apostle Paul's wonderful promise in Romans 8:38-39- "For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."
