

# Between You and Me x 2

On the heels of Memorial Day let's consider the heroic. Benaiah was part of King David's secret service detail known as "the mighty men". When he fled from Saul, David put Benaiah in charge of "the thirty" (1 Chron. 27:6), an elite group of soldiers known for their extraordinary bravery and valor. His courage and military prowess began before David was named King.

His exploits of bravery are listed in a passage regarding David's "Mighty Warriors" in 2 Samuel 23:20-23:

"Benaiah son Jehoiada, a valiant fighter from Kabzeel, performed great exploits. He struck down Moab's two mightiest warriors. He also went down into a pit on a snowy day and killed a lion. And he struck down a huge Egyptian. Although the Egyptian had a spear in his hand, Benaiah went against him with a club. He snatched the spear from the Egyptian's hand and killed him with his own spear. Such were the exploits of Benaiah son of Jehoiada; he too was as famous as the three mighty warriors. He was held in greater honor than any of the Thirty, but he was not included among the Three. And David put him in charge of his

bodyguard." Benaiah was fearless, brave, courageous, and loyal. Imagine facing a lion in a pit on a snowy day! No one in their right mind would do such a thing. I'm with the group running away from the pit. And yet, Benaiah jumped into the pit and killed the lion. Benaiah ran into situations that most of us run from. This is what heroes do. They have something within their DNA and

wiring, I call the "cour-

age switch". Every person has it to a degree. Think of a mother's innate drive to protect her children. However, Benaiah's drive was on another level.

As a former police chaplain, I have witnessed this drive in police officers more than once. These men and women run into danger while the rest of us flee. Soldiers, first responders, emergency medical teams in hospitals, astronauts, and explorers all have the drive to disregard their well-being for the sake of others or something greater. What makes a person so brave?

I don't think accolades and praise are the reason. Not long ago, I read an account of a 2-year-old boy who wandered off in the Arizona wilderness in very rough and wild country. A Great Pyrenees (Buford) dog rescued him, but the toddler had to walk a significant distance alongside him to safety. Both young Bodin and Buford have the "switch" within them. There is no way I would spend the night in rough terrain known for coyotes, snakes, and other predators.

This internal force that propels the brave is deeply connected to a sense of "calling" and faith. Upon his rescue, little Bodin's father was asked what he thought about it all, and he simply replied, "It's a story of faith on my side."

Every discipled Christ-follower has a sense of purpose, duty,

calling, and responsibility. The Holy Spirit empowers and gifts all of us in different ways (1 Cor. 12:1-11). The Benaiah's around us have an extraordinary sense of faith and hope. They don't give up when the odds are against them. They muster forces deep within that enable them to face the chal-

lenge before them. Don't sell yourself short! Don't compare yourself to the heroics of someone else. Just be willing to act when God calls. Simply answer "yes," and God will provide the rest. Your moment could be standing up for someone being bullied, holding the hand of a loved one near the end of life, speaking up when someone has been wronged, or just showing up and being

available. I'm so grateful for the heroes I've met on my journey. They are incredible. One of my favorites is a close brother (Airborne Ranger) who served in Iraq and Afghanistan. He was awarded three Purple Hearts and the Bronze Star for life-saving actions in battle. However, when you praise him, he always responds: "I was just doing what anyone else would do in my sit-

uation." John 15:13 captures the essence of the greatest hero ever known: "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends."
