A Sea Of Violence

Violence is nothing new. The first act of violence in Scripture was Cain killing his brother, Abel. We are just barely four chapters in when this occurs. Throughout history, we have witnessed the violent acts of tyrants, dictators, and madmen. The 20th Century wasn't any better, as violence crept into our national politics: JFK, MLK, RFK, Malcolm X, George Wallace, Kent State, Ronald Reagan, and others who were killed or wounded.

The nation mourned, and yet we failed to rise to the occasion and do better as we entered the 21st Century. Mass shootings (Sandy Hook Elementary, Mother Emmanuel Church, Las Vegas Strip, Orlando Nightclub, Virginia Tech, FSU, Uvalde, Parkland HS, New Year's Eve car attack in New Orleans, and many others) have become common in our head-

They are horrific, we mourn, hold prayer vigils, lawmakers make speeches, and promise changes. And yet just when we think it can't get any worse, it happens again, and again. Suppose you were on the outside looking in without any context. In that case, you might think mass shootings and assassinations of public figures in the U.S. have become an acceptable way to voice opposition. Just to be clear, IT IS NOT and NEVER HAS.

We haven't learned anything from the deaths and injuries of those in the 60s. In June, two couples (both with a spouse in the state legislature and one the Speaker of the House) were shot at their respective homes. One couple died, and the other survived being shot 17 times! Two attempts on the life of Donald Trump. The CEO of United Healthcare was shot in the heart of NYC, and most recently, the public assassination of Turning Point founder, Charlie Kirk, on a Utah college campus. I still have not watched the video and refuse to do so.

Every single one of these shootings and acts of violence is rooted in hate and insanity. But before we are so quick to go after the perpetrators, we need to ask what has happened specifically in the last 25 years to cultivate such an increase in mass-scale and public violence? I think it's the culmination of several things. Our culture and entertainment (movies, TV shows, video gaming, etc.) have absolutely become more violent. The Internet

has provided a global stage for those on the fringe. It gives voice to the absurd through social media while hiding behind a keyboard.

Freedom of speech has become a cauldron of vitriol, hate, malice, and anger that these people count on. Not so long ago, "yelling fire in a crowded theatre" was not free speech because it endangered the public. Today, we have those on social media holding matches and a gas can as they belch their hate. And inevitably, AFTER they have done their dirty deeds, officials find litanies, manifestos, and other evidence that should have been a clear warning of present or future danger.

This week, I witnessed, read, or heard sarcasm/jokes related to Charlie Kirk's murder that were clearly partisan (both sides), absolutely uncouth, and overloaded with the same venom/hate that must have driven his assassin. And many of these were by self-proclaimed Christians. The only difference is that their hate was verbalized, not demonstrated through physical action. Jesus told us that having hate in our hearts is the same as murder. He taught that we should love our enemies. He modeled that command even through an excruciating public execution. I'm with the Governor of Utah (R), who said we need to find an "off-ramp" to our national discourse of hatred for anyone who doesn't hold our view. Senator Bernie Sanders (D) posted a powerful statement on this issue in the last few days. And right now, someone, somewhere, is angry because I cited a Republican or a Democrat who both counseled reason over hate. Both condemned the murder

of Charlie Kirk. I know a gentleman who teaches a class at his church. He is very faithful in attendance and open about his faith. However, not long ago, he whispered (so he wouldn't be heard) this in my ear: "I hate liberals." And believe me, he said it convincingly, so there was no doubt he meant it. I shouldn't have, but I remained silent. Afterward, I thought about how he could be proud of teaching a certain class in his church and yet hold an attitude that is absolutely the polar opposite of Jesus. And haven't we all at some point?

My point is non-political. I'm simply pointing out the extremity of both sides that foster such anger, malice, and vitriol. We must accept respon-
