Carrollton Utilities Company as an upstairs engineering room with a flat tar roof overtop.

With the building gutted and the roof col-

lapsing, a backhoe was brought in at the front of the building to help tear down and expose the burning roof and provide better access to water hoses while a ladder truck attacked the blaze from the rear of the structure.

"When you're fighting a fire with a ladder truck it's

not a good thing," Hoffmann said of the total loss.

A cause of the fire is not yet known and based on the destruction it may be difficult to determine. Firefighters were on the scene for several hours and came back later Friday night to check for hot spots.

Firefighters from Carrollton, Westside and Ghent fire company responded to the call — about 14 volunteers total — with crowd and traffic control by Carrollton Police Department and the Carroll County Sheriffs Office, equipment support by the Carrollton

Street Department and emergency support by the Carroll County Emergency Medical Services.

Hofmann said firefighters, using the radio repeater at Butler Park, had no issues with communication at the scene or in summoning volunteers from the three

responding departments under their auto aide agreement. The county had lost its main antenna tower a week earlier and has been reconfiguring its communications system since in an effort to work around that problem until permanent repairs can be made.

For the past several years, Todd has been on a single-minded mission to make his dream a reality. He and Jimmy Davis conceived and founded the Madison Music Movement, the organization behind the branding of Indiana's Music City. He was the driving force behind the Madison Recording Studio on Second Street, and he was instrumental in getting Mad Paddle Brewery to happen. He's building a speakeasy music venue in the basement of one of his Main Street properties. And he's helping Crawdaddy Music relocate to a new building.

But one of the coolest things he's doing is happening this weekend, on Saturday, April 5, from 2 to 7 p.m. It's called The Food & Music Pop Up, and it's at 522 West Street in the parking lot across from the old KDH hospital, next to the ambulance garage. "We own that vacant parking lot," explains Todd, "and I was thinking about different ways to put it to

use to benefit the town.

"I'd seen these food truck pop ups in other cities, where all the local trucks come together at one location, maybe once a month. There'd be a music stage and a bar, and it would just be this great festive atmosphere. I talked to the local food truck operators back in the fall and they liked the idea. So we hired a band to play for the day, catered a bar, and put the word out. The first one was a huge hit! So now we're doing it again, to see if we can maybe make it a more regular thing."

Food trucks scheduled to participate include DonutNV-Madison, Pakalana's Poke Wagon, German Corner, Rollin' Roosters and Troublemakers Food Truck, with New Madison Brewing providing their fresh, local craft beer. Bring your own chair if you want to sit and listen to the bands.

"This is of course a family-friendly event, and there were a lot of kids last time we did it, all having a great time. People just kept asking, When are you going to do this again? So we know there's a lot of interest and energy around it. We encourage everyone

to come out and enjoy some of the best music and food Madison has to offer."

I'd be remiss if I didn't mention one other Todd Boone-directed venture that is coming up in early May, the annual Madison Music Movement Derby Party at Richwood on the River. This all-day event is the main fundraiser for M3, and it's also the undisputed best party of the season. One ticket price includes all day food, drinks, live music, dancing and horse racing action on the big screen TVs. Tickets are available at MadTixEvents.com, and I am personally asking everyone to join us for the party. You'll have an amazing time, and you'll be supporting the live music scene in Madison. Hope to see you there!
