Both Carroll, Trimble dealt losses

Carroll County football suffered a 50-9 loss on the road at Bourbon County on Friday in Paris.

The Panthers' scoring was limited to a 29-yard field goal by Yerson Aguilar with 6:58 left in the first quarter and a 2-yard touchdown run by Karson Vaught with 2:06 left before halftime with the PAT blocked to send the Colonels into the intermission leading 30-9.

Bourbon (7-1) outgained the Panthers 380 yards to 103 including

177-23 on the ground and 203-80 in the air. Senior running back Shayne Bowling rushed nine times for 131 yards and a touchdown and senior quarterback Malachi Rennie had four keepers for 18 yards and two scores while Bryson Carr added one 12-yard carry for a touchdown.

Rennie also passed 26 times for 12 completions, 180 yards and a score. Junior backup Julius Gregory was 2-of-4 passing for 23 yards and a score. Senior receiver Jacob Ezell caught three passes for 70 yards and a touchdown to lead Bourbon and

Quinton Rice caught a 5-yard pass for the other TD with freshman kicker Silas McKinney going 6-of-7 on PATs.

Carroll, now 4-4 on the season, hosts unbeaten Lloyd Memorial on Friday. The 8-0 Juggernauts were responsible for Bourbon's lone loss, 22-20 on Oct. 3, and enter the game off a 41-6 win over Henry County last Friday night.

HOLY CROSS SHUTS DOWN TRIMBLE

Trimble County was on the wrong end of a 58-0 loss to unbeaten Covington Holy Cross Friday on the road.

The Indians rolled up 338 total yards in the win while limiting Trimble to negative net yardage on the night — eight yards passing and minus nine yards rushing — as Holy Cross was in on 10 tackles for a loss.

The Raiders also turned the ball over five times with three fumbles and two interceptions as the Indians improved to 8-0.

Holy Cross sophomore quarterback Brian Ferguson completed 6-of-11 passes for 88 yards and three touchdowns and junior Max Hunt had a 9-yard pass for a score for the Indians.

Charles Oglesby ran seven times for 96 yards and two scores, Trevin Figgs had four carries for 39 yards and two scores and Dustin Wilson carried three times for 55 yards and a score. Kicker Gabriel Romito made 4-of-9 PATs for the other points.

Trimble, now 2-6 on the season, hosts Bishop Brossart Friday. The Mustangs (3-5) lost to Holy Cross in a 6-3 defensive showdown on Oct. 10 but enter the game off a 21-20 win at Ludow last Friday.

Lowe shoulder a concern to UK coming out of Blue-White

LEXINGTON — Kentucky men's basketball point guard Jaland Lowe stole the headlines following the 2025 Blue-White game, but not for the reasons one may have expected.

Taking the court as a member of the White team, things would take a turn in the second half of the scrimmage when a collision between himself and returning phenom Otega Owhe would see Lowe go down hard clutching his right shoulder.

After being down for a moment, Lowe was helped to his feet by training staff and immediately left the playing surface and went into the locker room. The White team would fall 35-26 and Mark Pope and the Kentucky staff decided to end things there instead of playing bonus basketball that had been teased prior.

Following the scrimmage, Pope would not be asked about the injury on the broadcast, but he would not escape the postgame press conference without being forced to discuss the matter.

"He tweaked his shoulder, so we'll see," Pope said. "(We) set him down out of caution. We'll know more tomorrow, we'll get some imaging."

Freshman Jasper Johnson

was also asked about Lowe's injury and whether or not he would be comfortable having to step into a larger role if things are negative with Lowe's imaging.

"I'm very comfortable," Johnson said. "I know he may go down, but we are a team. I know everybody is willing to step up (in) their role. I know he's a big part of our team right now, playing the one, being the head of our snake. We don't know much in detail of his injury, but we're all, you know, still being with him through this process."

Lowe transferred to Kentucky in the offseason from Pittsburgh and is expected to be the Wildcats' starting point guard.

With the Panthers last season, Lowe finished with 16.8 points and 5.5 assists per game while shooting 37% from the field.

Coming into Kentucky, Lowe spoke about growing into a more efficient role within the Wildcats, which may boast one of the deepest teams in the country.

"It's (quality shots) been super emphasized," Lowe said on Media Day. "I told them (Kentucky) when they recruited me that one of my goals is to be as consistent as possible. We work every day to make my game

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Trimble, Carroll close out volleyball seasons

Trimble County and Carroll County volleyball opened 31st District tournament play Monday at Gallatin County with the Raiders ousting the Panthers 3-0 in the quarterfinals.

Trimble rolled over Carroll 25-15 and 25-14 before the Panthers put up more of a fight in the third set before falling 25-20.

The Raiders then played second-seeded Henry County, which along with top-seeded Eminence had earned a bye into the semifinals, and lost 3-1 to also end their season.

Henry rolled 25-13 in the first two sets before Trimble battled back to delay elimination 25-23 in set three. The LadyCats then closed out the match 25-16 in the fourth set.

Henry (19-9) advanced to play Eminence in Wednesday night's championship game. The Warriors (23-1) had eliminated Owen County 25-6, 25-15, 25-4 in the semifinals after the Rebels (15-12) had outlasted Gallatin County (7-18) in a 25-17, 25-19, 18-25, 19-25, 15-7 marathon in
