# Columbus park museum was once home to the town's Confederate mayor

I'd heard the museum Columbus-Belmont State Park was the home of B.W. Sharp, the rabidly pro-Confederate mayor of Columbus when the Civil War started.

So, I emailed my friend, historian John Kelly Ross of Clinton. He probably knows more about Columbus history than anybody alive.
