Mary Rose Bell



Standards and Assessment Process Review Committee meets virtually Sept. 9th

KRS 158.6453 calls for the Kentucky Department of Education to implement a process for reviewing all academic standards and aligned assessments. The schedule calls for one

or two content areas to be reviewed each year and every six years thereafter on a rotating basis.

At 11 next

Tuesday morning,

the commissioner shall

provide a report to the SAPRC summarizing the process and the resulting recommendations.

After receiving the commissioner's report,

the standards and

assessment process

review committee shall either concur that stakeholders have had adequate opportunity to provide input on standards and the corresponding alignment of state assessments or find the

input process deficient.

The SAPRC is comprised of the commissioner of education or designee as a nonvoting member and nine voting representatives of public schools,

of whom at least two shall be parents of public-school students, appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate.

Somerset Community College Receiving \$6 Million

Last week, Governor Beshear and Congressman Harold Rogers announced nearly \$26 million to help support education, tourism and economic development in Kentucky's Appalachian region.

Fifteen recipients in 11 counties, including Pulaski County are receiving the funds as part of the Abandoned

Mine Land Economic Revitalization (AMLER) Program.

When completed, the projects are expected to retain or create more than 3,500 jobs and train up to 1,200 Kentuckians annually.

Projects receiving

funding will expand quality health care throughout the region, improve

drinking water and wastewater treatment facilities, enhance

high-tech training and employment opportunities, and support economic development and

tourism. Infrastructure improvements will serve 240 businesses and more than 17,000 households. Community wellness projects will treat 900,000 people annually, and tourism projects are expected to bring nearly 110,000 new visitors to the region each year.

Congressman Rogers, who championed the program as chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, has overseen \$1 billion in federal funding go toward AMLER since 2016, of which more than \$253 million has been awarded for more than 100 projects.

These grants are

investing in strong

projects that will

support economic

growth and stability in

our coal communities,"

said Congressman

Rogers. "We are fast-

tracking projects that

will create new jobs

and improve tourism,

health care, education, emergency services and infrastructure in southern and eastern Kentucky. Our best days are ahead of us and these projects ensure that we are on the right path for innovation and revitalization."

The projects selected for funding through the \$25.95 million 2025 AMLER grant

funding include the

Somerset Community

College Career and

Technical Education

Training Complex.

SCC has been selected

to receive \$6 million

to develop a career

and technical facility

training programs like

construction, HVAC,

welding, automotive

and diesel technology,

electrical technology,

and industrial

funds will be used for
