ALLEN COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION
PROPOSED TAX NOTIFICATION

District: Allen County
School Year: 2026-2027
Prepared: August 2026

The Allen County Board of Education is proposing a general fund tax levy of **46.3 cents on real property and 53.3 cents on personal property.**

The General Fund tax levied in fiscal year 2026 was 48.0 cents on real property and 53.3 cents on personal property and produced revenue of \$7,394,031.84. The proposed General Fund tax rate of 46.3 cents on real property and 53.3 cents on personal property is expected to produce \$7,988,638.89. Of this amount, \$1,045,606.87 is from new and personal property. The compensating tax for 2027 is 44.6 cents on real property and 53.3 cents on personal property and is expected to produce \$7,733,058.55.

The proposed rate is expected to generate more revenue than received in the preceding year. The general areas to which revenue of \$594,607.05 above fiscal year 2026 revenue is to be allocated are as follows: Cost of collections, \$17,838.21; building fund, \$215,260.35; instruction, \$260,286.11; transportation, \$28,920.68; and maintenance of plant, \$72,301.70.

the first pitch on a new softball field. It provided residents their first real opportunity to see what Allen County Fiscal Court has been developing on the property in the White Plains community.

“This gets a lot of the people from the public out here seeing what’s been done in the park,” Harper added. “I think they’re kind of awestruck when they see how nice this park is and how nice it’s going to be.”

The park is being developed as a major recreational destination for Allen County, with ballfields, basketball and pickleball courts, fishing ponds and additional amenities planned for the future.

Harper said the goal from the beginning has been to provide Allen County children and families recreational facilities comparable to those found in larger neighboring communities.

“We’re just very, very honored to be serving Allen County and to be able to bring a park like this to our community,” Harper said. “Our kids deserve to play on just as nice fields as Barren County’s kids and Warren County’s kids. Our fiscal court has felt that way from day one, and that’s the reason you see what you see before you today.”

For the record, eighth-grader Hadley Byrn had the honor to throw the first competitive pitch into the glove of teammate Elliott Dinkins. Bazzell’s A team defeated Russell County 6-0 with the B team winning 9-2. More home games for the middle school may be at the new park as the middle school works their way through their two-month schedule.

component,” Cook added. “We have participated in multiple scrimmages and camps against high-level competition and each time have come out with a lot of positives. The matter is not ‘if’ the team will gel together, it’s when and when that happens, it will really be something special to watch.”

The Lady Patriots will be led by five seniors who have each spent time on the varsity floor. That experience could become especially important during the opening weeks as younger players settle into larger roles.

Senior Lily Cook returns with the most varsity experience and gives the Lady Patriots flexibility across the floor. She can provide different looks offensively and, when needed, remain on the court for all six rotations.

“She is definitely a vocal leader for our young kids,” Cook said. “I am excited to see what Lily brings to the floor this year.”

Ashlyn Meador provides another experienced option along the front line. Meador can play in the middle or on the right side and brings a combination of offensive creativity and blocking ability.

“Ashlyn gives you many different looks in terms of her crafty shots, but is also one of our best blockers,” Cook noted. “I am so encouraged with how she is continuing to work this offseason and expect a big senior year for her.”

In the middle, Alex Walker has the ability to become one of AC-S’s most imposing offensive players. Cook believes Walker possesses the explosiveness to take over stretches of matches.

“She definitely has the potential to be our most explosive hitter and can overpower defenses coming from the middle,” Cook said. “Her block is also felt at a high clip.”

Ava Calvert will step into a significant role as an outside hitter after putting considerable effort into improving her strength, agility and offensive game. Cook believes Calvert’s ceiling may be higher than what people see during the opening weeks.

“There aren’t a lot of people that have worked harder than Ava this offseason,” Cook pointed out. “I am so encouraged with where Ava is at, but even more excited about where she is going to be by the middle of the season.”

Then there is Addison Ramsey, who moves into the libero position after being an important part of the Lady Patriot back row last season. Her responsibilities will extend beyond passing and defense. Ramsey will be counted on to provide energy and leadership for a younger group behind the front line.

“She is our spark plug, and we will go as Addison goes,” Cook stated. “She’s bound for a big year.”

Cook sees those five seniors as the foundation for everything ACS hopes to accomplish.

“This senior class is super exciting to be around,” the coach said. “I am so grateful for their leadership and will continue to ask for it as the season gets started.”

Perhaps the most intriguing part

of this Lady Patriot team is what comes after the senior class. Cook has options—a lot of them. He believes that depth could become one of AC-S’s biggest advantages.

“We have a relatively deep roster that helps us push practices to a different level to where we are challenging each other each day,” Cook explained. “That will definitely pay off as the season progresses.”

Juniors Baylee Speegle, Grayce Maye Stinson and Marlee Gaddis each provide something different. Speegle can work from the middle or right side and has developed into a dependable attacker. Stinson gives the Lady Patriots another option on the pin and continues to improve as a passer. Gaddis provides a steady defensive presence with her passing continuing to get better each week we are in the gym.”

The sophomore class gives AC-S even more possibilities. Whitley Shrum has impressed during preseason competition with her athleticism, power and blocking ability. Kinlee Sikes will handle part of the setting responsibilities and has already earned considerable confidence from her coach. Julia Schaberg gives AC-S another offensive option on either pin and has developed what Cook describes as a “nasty serve.”

Meanwhile, Liza Connor and Audrey Bonds add depth in the back row.

A strong freshmen class adds even more punch. According to Cook, Dani Cates, Landry Monroe and
