HEALTH NEWS:

-Following up the announcement from the West Coast that there is serious danger of an outbreak of smallpox, members of the Pulaski County Health Department this week issued a warning to residents of Somerset and Pulaski County that all persons should be vaccinated against this disease. A medical officer in Honolulu recently stated that the United States was "sitting on a volcano of disease" from the Orient which might erupt in a major epidemic at any time. An outbreak of smallpox in the San Francisco area could very easily spread across the country as it is one of the distribution points for service men returning from the Pacific theatre of war, the local health department warned.

Several farmers have already entered the one acre and five acre contests which are being sponsored by the Somerset Kiwanis Club and the Farmers National Bank. All farmers are urged to enter this contest to see who can raise the most corn per acre. Some good prizes are being offered. All entries must be enrolled by May 1.
-Cy Waddle, Strawberry, has a good stand of alfalfa, alsike clover, timothy, and oats that he sowed in March. He will cut this crop for hay. His potatoes, peas and onions are large enough to work.
-Becham Claunch says he has the best cover crop he ever saw for tobacco. Last September he sowed two bushels wheat, two bushels barley, 30 pounds vetch and 20 pounds crimson clover per acre. It is two and a half feet high now and he says that it is thick as hair on a dog's back.
