“Earth Day - 55th Anniversary”

The 2026 Theme is: “Our Power, Our Planet”

Earth Day is “every day, and anywhere you are”

The three main pillars of the campaign are power, people, and planet.

We need power. To get it, we need to fully harness the potential of our planet's resources which is why we are calling for tripling of renewable energy generation by 2030. This goal may sound ambitious, but collectively solar, wind, hydroelectric, geothermal, and tidal energies can meet this challenge head on.

We need equity. A transition to renewable energy will empower poorer global communities by giving them access to the one thing that we in the North tend to take for granted every single day: electricity.

Our planet needs us to embrace renewables. A rapid deployment of renewable energy is essential for combating climate change because simply

put, renewable energy generates electricity without producing carbon dioxide, the primary greenhouse gas.

When is Earth Day and why is it celebrated?

Earth Day is an annual event celebrated around the world on April 22 to demonstrate support for environmental protection. First celebrated in 1970, it now includes events coordinated globally by the Earth Day Network in more than 193 countries.

How did April 22nd become Earth Day?

Wisconsin Senator Gaylord Nelson is widely credited with suggesting the first Earth Day on April 22. The date was selected in part with college campuses in mind; April 22 fell between spring break and final exams in 1970.

Earth Day began as a “national teach-in on the environment” and to maximize the number of students that could be reached on university campuses. By raising public awareness of pollution, Nelson hoped to bring environmental causes

into the national spotlight.

Activities associated with the day often include **planting trees, support and protect our pollinators, conserve water activities, raising awareness about recycling, volunteering for green projects reducing the amount of energy people consume** and several others.

Today, not only is Earth Day a day meant to increase awareness of environmental problems, but also it is becoming a popular time for many communities to get together to clean up litter, plant trees, or simply reflect on the beauty of nature.

Earth Day is intended to **inspire awareness of and appreciation for the Earth's environment.**

Kentucky voters be a big green monster? You decide,” said Adams. “Our youngest Kentuckians are ready to step up with their creative ideas to make November’s election a success.”

The finalists will be chosen by the Secretary of State’s Office to go on a ballot to be voted on during the 2026 Kentucky State Fair. The top vote getter’s design will be printed on stickers and sent to interested county clerks to provide to general election voters.

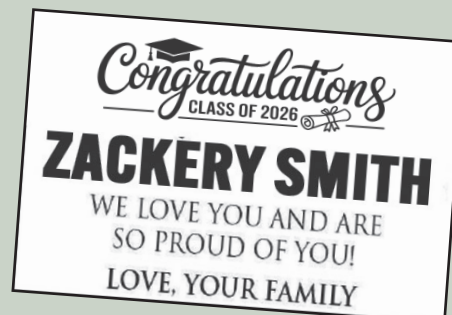
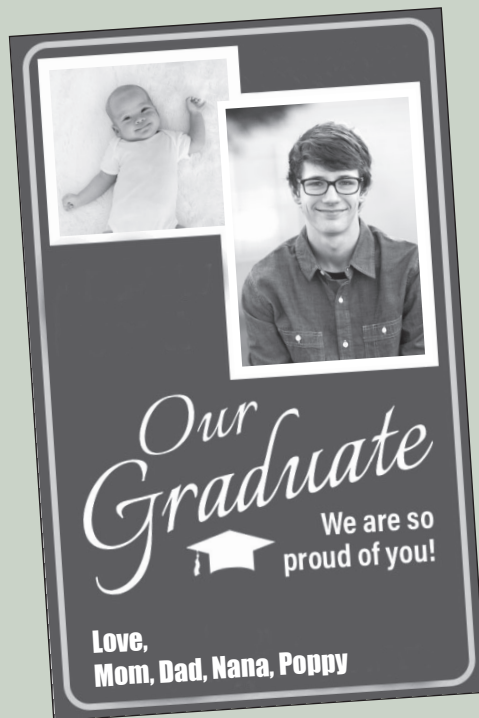
