I would like to thank the members of the William Dudley Chapter of DAR for fixing one of our front windows this week in honor of “Constitution Week”, which they will celebrate beginning September 17th thru 24th. If you look around town, you will see yard signs about the week. In addition to our window, the Fleming County Library and Peoples Bank also have displays. On September 17th at 4:00, the Daughters will be ringing bells throughout Flemingsburg and Fleming County. Proclamations will also be signed by the Mayor and Judge Executive as well as principals in the schools. During this year of America’s 250 we should especially remember not only the

Declaration of Independence, but the U.S. Constitution as the frameworks for our country. In September, our special display deals with schools. Many remember when school did not start till after Labor Day, so we felt this display was appropriate for this month. While we have various items and pictures which have been donated through the years, to use in our display, we always appreciate any items, pictures, clippings that you might have that you are willing to loan. Remember the Fleming County Covered Bridge Museum is open on Wednesdays from 19-4 and on Saturdays from 12-4. We are happy to arrange other days and times for groups.

I’m getting excited about our very first Fleming County Trivia contest coming up this Sunday, September 13th at 2:00 at the museum. We will have the contest upstairs. We will ask you to form groups. Questions will be given and groups will have a chance to confer, then write their answers on wipe-off boards. We’ll keep track of correct answers for each group and tally the points at the end to determine a winner. We will have two rounds with a break in between. The winners will receive prizes. Light refreshments will be available during the break. For those of you who love his-

tory, we think this will be a fun way to learn about Fleming County. Our Quilt show is also coming up this month. On Saturday, September 26th from 10-4 and Sunday, September 27th from 2-5, we will be open for you to come and look at the quilts which have been brought in for display. The Fleming County Quilters Group have made panels of some of the quilt patterns that were used to help slaves find their way to freedom on the Underground Railroad, which will be displayed along with a short explanation of what each pattern meant. We invite anyone who has quilts, whether you have made them, bought them, or received them as gifts to bring them in for the display. We hope to have a variety of patterns, types of quilts whether they be hand stitched and quilted, machine quilted, embroidered, or cross stitched, new or old. We also would love to have the story of your quilt; whether it be one that was handed down, or one that you acquired at an auction. Quilts may be brought to the museum on Wednesday, September 23rd from 10-4 or on Friday, September 25th from 4-7. To give you a heads

up; we will be sponsoring another Scavenger Hunt in downtown Flemingsburg on Saturday, October 10th. Our first Hunt was very successful, so we thought we’d do another one. You may come into the museum beginning at 12:00 when we open, to pick up your picture clue sheet. You must turn them in by 3:00 so that we can determine the number correct and award prizes to the winners. This is a great way to get to see some of the amazing architecture that Flemingsburg has and learn more about its history. The last several weeks, I have been sharing some information which I found on various men who served during the American Revolution, who came to Fleming County and lived here (if only for a time). As stated before, I have used the names from the list of pensioners that was published by the SAR in 1896 which I found on the site “Kentucky Genealogy Trails.” The information gives the name, rank, military service, when they applied for a pension, and death date if before 1840. This is by no means a complete list. As I said before, many of our Revolutionary War veterans who came to

Fleming County, died before applying for a pension. Thomas McAtinney was born in 1749 in Scotland and died in 1827 in Fleming County. He is buried at the Elizaville Cemetery. He was a private in the Pennsylvania line, serving under Captain Church and Col. Anthony Wayne. According to information found on Find a Grave, he would have been involved in battles in the Canadian Expedition. McAtinney applied for a pension in 1819, which he received. According to his application, Thomas was living with his daughter Elizabeth Purdum, who was a widow with several children. The site does not give his wife’s name but list other children as: Jane McAtinney Cochran, Mary McAtinney Hilligoss, Margaret McAtinney Harper, and James McAtinney. Joseph Goddard is a name which is familiar to many of us who live in this county. Goddard is listed as a private in the Virginia line. He first applied for a pension in 1831. As the story goes, Joseph was only 15 years old when he enlisted. He was born in 1761 in Fauquier County, Virginia to John and Mollie McTier Goddard. According to a booklet written by George J. and Mary Goddard, “Joseph enlisted in George Washington’s Continental Army in January of 1777. Captain Blackwell’s 6th Co, 10th Reg. One year into his service he was promoted to Corporal. He was part of 1st Co, 2nd Battalion, 1st Regular Light Brigade. Joseph was separated from the corp after the battle of Stony Point and from the army in 1779. He married Francis Glasscock in 1779 and they went on to have 13 children. Joseph, along with his family, his parents, etc. came into Kentucky and settled in Fleming County in 1797 after living in Ohio and what is now West Virginia. Joseph and Francis deeded land in 1824 for the purpose of erecting a Methodist Episcopal Church and burial ground. That land still has a Methodist church and cemetery today.

In obedience to an Order of Sale entered on the 11" day of August, 2026, in the above action, I will, as Master Commissioner proceed on: THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 10, 2026 FAMILY COURT ROOM FLEMING COUNTY JUSTICE CENTER FLEMINGSBURG, FLEMING COUNTY, KENTUCKY AT 10:00 A.M. to sell the real estate located at 2972 Ewing Road, Ewing, Fleming County, Kentucky 41039. This property is described in a Deed of record in Deed Book 268, Page 17, Fleming County Clerk's Office, with the PVA calling for 1 acre. Parcel Mapping number: 011-90-00-007.00.
This sale is to satisfy Judgment in the sum of \$186,614.96, plus interest, taxes, court costs and attorney fees. The purchaser may pay in enough at the sale if he/she chooses to do so. Otherwise, the purchaser immediately after the sale shall pay not less than 10% of the purchase price, and execute bond with surety, who is a Kentucky resident with net worth of greater or equal to the amount of the bond and who is approved by the Master Commissioner, and who must be present at the sale and execute the sale bond and affidavit of surety at the sale, for the balance of the purchase price, payable to the Fleming Circuit Court Clerk within thirty days with interest at 8.25% per annum on the balance from date of sale until paid in full. The bond shall have the force of a judgment and a first lien shall be retained on the property as security for the payment of said bond and interest.
