planned to discuss were already on the agenda.

The court reviewed the county treasurer's report, approved bills and considered transfers listed in the meeting packet.

One transfer addressed a lapse in health insurance payments.

"The health insurance we had to pay in January and February because it was delinquent and we didn't know it," an official explained. "Insurance let us know, so that's not so expensive."

Magistrates approved the transfers as presented.

Martin reported they would be interviewing three applicants immediately following the meeting to fill an open position as Treasurer Christian Lattus resigned from that role effective Jan. 31.

"We're going to interview three applicants," Martin said, with discussion noting a learning curve associated with the role. Martin also praised Gallimore and county office staff for really stepping up and taking on Lattus' workload in the days since she left.

Judge Executive Martin updated the court on the proposed transfer of a communications tower asset from American Tower, now operating as Greencom Marketing.

"This is a major, major asset that's been given," Martin said.

He reported that documents had been approved and that the county must register the Federal Communications Commission number as part of the transfer process.

He said help had been sought from individuals familiar with FCC registration and showed the process was likely already in place.

"There are lots of federal agencies working here," Martin said, adding that the goal is to complete the transfer without delay.

"Get that iron is hot, so I think they need to strike."

He emphasized the distinction between ownership of the tower structure and the underlying ground and said the county must ensure all required elements are included before finalizing the transaction.

The court then approved moving forward with the transfer.

Magistrates approved Resolution 2026-R-7, which Martin described as authorizing the judge-executive to execute certain documents on behalf of the county.

He explained the resolution is tied to procurement requirements and federal compliance.

"It is a federal procurement code that we're required to have documentation that we're following that code," Martin said, noting the policy must be reaffirmed when the county takes part in federally funded programs.

The court also approved Resolutions 2026-R-9 and 2026-R-10. One measure addressed revenue and expenditure reporting requirements for grant-funded projects, including Community Development Block Grant programs.

"We must do this on all CDBG grants we will apply for in the future," Martin said, referencing regulatory requirements triggered when the county receives unanticipated funds during a fiscal year.

Magistrates approved Ordinance 2026-0-1 related to tax revenue allocations and associated repayment structures.

Discussion included reference to a 3% portion of revenue directed into a shared account that multiple entities may access.

"They're only 3% — that 3% comes into an account, which we and others can apply for," Martin said, describing it as "a pool that

everybody can draw something."

It was noted fluctuations in gas consumption had affected revenue projections.

"The reason is that gas is down," Martin said, explaining that reduced consumption impacted distributions compared to prior years.

The court received a report on county road aid funding and discussed coordination with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet on eligible projects and reimbursement procedures.

Magistrates approved two change orders tied to bridge projects, including the Crutchfield Road bridge contract.

Officials said the State Highway Department helped develop estimates for additional improvements totaling \$64,670.40.

"This has worked out really, really good because they came up with \$64,000 worth of traditional im-

provements that we need to make," Martin said.

The court approved the \$64,670.40 change order.

A second change order for the Sawmill Road bridge project in the amount of \$29,896 also received approval.

Before entering closed session, Martin addressed proposed state-level changes that could affect local jail funding, warning of potentially severe financial consequences.

"This bill could be devastating to us if they leave out certain parts," he said, particularly provisions emphasizing regional jails.

Martin said Fulton County is in a comparatively stable position but cautioned that many counties are sub-

sidizing jail operations at significant local expense.

"One thing I'm going to propose ... is that we put an education component to the workplace and that we expand rehabilitation and education," he said.

The court voted to enter closed session under KRS 61.810. Martin shared that the closed session would include the interviewing of three applicants for the county treasurer position.

Martin noted that no action would be taken in the closed meeting and adjourned the regular meeting.

The next meeting of the Fulton County Fiscal Court is scheduled for 9 a.m. Mon., March 16, at the Mills Point Community Center in Hickman, Ky.
