Child Find for Children with Disabilities in Need of Special Education Services 2026-2027 School year

The Williamstown Independent School District has an ongoing “Child Find” system, which is designed to locate, identify and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (3) to twenty-one (21) years, who may have a disability and be in need of Special Education. This includes children who are not in school; those who are in public, private, or home school; those who are highly mobile such as children who are migrant or homeless; and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education.

The Williamstown Independent School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who qualifies for Special Education services, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided appropriate Special Education services at no cost to the parents of the child.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Williamstown Independent School District find any child who may have a disability and need Special Education services. The Williamstown Independent School District needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child; the name, address, and phone number of the parent or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education is needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways the Williamstown Independent School District collects the information needed. The information the school District collects will be used to contact the parents of the child and find out if the child needs to be evaluated or referred for Special Education services.

SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE

The City of Dry Ridge, Kentucky, at a meeting held on June 15, 2026, adopted the following Ordinance No. 919-2026:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF DRY RIDGE, IN GRANT COUNTY, KENTUCKY, ADOPTING A BUDGET AND PAYPLAN FOR THE CITY OF DRY RIDGE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING ON JULY 1, 2026, AND PROVIDING THAT NO MONIES SHALL BE EXPENDED BY OR ON BEHALF OF THE CITY OF DRY RIDGE EXCEPT IN ACCORDANCE WITH THAT ADOPTED BUDGET AND ALL PAY FOR EVERY EMPLOYEE SHALL BE BASED ACCORDING TO THE PAYPLAN

The purpose of the Ordinance is to adopt a budget for Fiscal Year 2026/2027 and to set forth in detail the approved budgeted revenue and expenses. It is to further insure that no monies are spent which are not set forth in the approved budget. Finally, the Ordinance establishes the pay plan for all employees.

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and what the money is being used for.

But according to a report released last week by the Kentucky Center for Economic Policy, 90% of awarded opioid funds haven't actually been used.

As of June 2025, more than \$94.5 million in opioid settlement funds were granted across Kentucky's 120 counties, and another \$28 million to 149 cities, according to the report released Tuesday by the Berea-based research and advocacy group.

The money is required to be spent on prevention through education, training and support for families, harm reduction, treatment and recovery support.

Their report also outlined “good spending” and “problematic spending” from local governments that had used a portion of their opioid abatement funds.

Many of the projects that were dubbed as “good spending” included community-based resources, and not programs that were police-led, according to the report.

However, “problematic spending” entries showed some funds were spent on unproven or ineffective purposes, or programs thought to cause additional harm.
