BRECKINRIDGE CIRCUIT COURT - DIVISION 1

Breckinridge Circuit Court, Division 1, met on Wednesday, Sept. 16 with Judge Bruce Butler presiding.

Kenneth E. Gonterman pleaded not guilty to first degree possession of a controlled substance (meth), second offense, and operating a motor vehicle under the influence of a substance. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for November 18.

Alvin R. Withem pleaded not guilty to first degree criminal mischief. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for

November 18.

Richard N. Brozzo pleaded not guilty to first degree strangulation (domestic violence related) and second degree assault (domestic violence). A pre-trial conference was scheduled for November 18.

William T. Dowell was sentenced to 12 years in prison for first degree unlawful imprisonment and 30 days for fourth degree assault. In another case, he was sentenced to five years in prison for flagrant non-support.
