significant travel and time commitments to renew their driver's licenses.

Senate Bill 7 provides local communities with the flexibility to offer basic renewal and duplicate license services. Under the bill, one of four local offices—circuit court clerks, county clerks, sheriffs, or judges/executives—can opt to provide these services if they choose. Should a county's designated officials not opt in, the county can coordinate with a neighboring county to establish service access for its residents.

This initiative ensures that Kentuckians gain greater access to essential services without removing existing options. For individuals in counties where local services are not yet offered, online and mail-in renewals remain available for eligible applicants, and pop-up service events may continue. SB 7 introduces a practical, voluntary step toward localizing services and bringing them closer to home for constituents.

The Senate's swift passage of SB 7, with 29 co-sponsors, underscores the widespread recognition of the challenges Kentuckians face



1st Corinthians 1:1-3, "And I, brethren, could not speak unto you as unto spiritual, but as unto carnal, even as unto babes in Christ. I have fed you with milk, and not with meat: for hitherto ye were not able to bear it, neither yet now are ye able. For ye are yet carnal: for whereas there is among you envying, and strife, and divisions, are ye not carnal, and walk as men?"

The Book of Corinthians is a wealth of information about the Gospel of Jesus Christ, as well as many instructions for the way a church should operate. If we read carefully, we can gain a great amount of information about issues that the church at Corinth had to deal with.
