Missing Fleming County woman found deceased

A Fleming County woman has been found deceased after going missing on June 17.

According to the Flemingsburg Police Department (FPD), Debra Wireman, 69, of Fleming County was last seen on Wednesday, June 17 at approximately 4:30 p.m. in Aberdeen, Ohio, where she had been staying with family. She was believed to have been traveling toward Maysville, Ky.

FPD Chief Daniel Pollock stated that after being notified that Wireman had been reported missing, the FPD sent an officer to her residence; however, no

one was home.

The FPD reported that Wireman had been driving a white 2020 Kia Forte with damage to its front end.

On Wednesday, July 8, Pollock released a statement via social media containing a “difficult update” regarding Wireman’s disappearance.

Pollock stated that Wireman’s vehicle had been located in Clermont County, Ohio on Friday, July 3. Human remains were located inside the vehicle. On Tuesday, July 7, the Clermont County Coroner’s Office was able to positively identify the remains as Wireman’s.

“While this is not the outcome any of us hoped and prayed for, we are thank-

ful that Debra has been found and that her family can now begin to receive the closure they deserve,” Pollock stated.

He added that the Clermont County Sheriff’s Office will conduct the ongoing investigation into Wireman’s death.

“Out of respect for Debra’s family and the integrity of that investigation, no additional information will be released by the Flemingsburg Police Department at this time,” Pollock continued.

He further expressed his and the FPD’s appreciation for everyone who helped spread the word of Wireman’s disappearance, remained vigilant, provided information and supported its investigation.

“The overwhelming response from our community, neighboring agencies, the media, and countless individuals across the region demonstrated the very best of people coming together in the hope of bringing someone home safely,” Pollock stated. “Your assistance was invaluable, and we are truly grateful for your compassion and willingness to help.”

He continued, “Thank you to all of the law enforcement agencies, first responders, volunteers, and partner organizations who assisted throughout this investigation. Your professionalism, dedication, and cooperation were instrumental in the efforts to locate Debra.”
