school, so our SROs are now active in our schools,” Swolsky stated. He further noted that the MCSO is still waiting for its two new trucks. The 2025 tax settlement (LSG Bill) was also presented to the fiscal court. Following the MCSO's report, Mason County Jailer Lisa Yeary presented the Mason County Detention Center's report. The report indicated that the detention center's highest daily number of inmates in August was 143 and the lowest was 132. Of the center's inmates, 108 were males and 29 were females. Of these, 84 were from Mason County, 12 were from Bracken County, 51 were from Fleming County, 17 were from Lewis County and 12 were from other counties. The total number of individuals

admitted and released from the detention center in August was 253. Additionally, inmates worked 6,520 hours of community service in August, saving the county \$78,240 in labor costs. According to Yeary, Class D inmates are continuing to assist the recycling center and road department, as well as Licking Valley Commodities, the Mason County Food Bank, the Lewisburg Lions Club, the YMCA and the Rotary Club. The C.O.R.E. Program's two employees are the Gardens of St. Patrick and the Mason County Fiscal Court. Yeary then stated that during Labor Day weekend, one of the stove-top ovens' hoses broke and caused a fire. Although it was contained, the jail's gas had to be shut off everywhere because there it only has one shut-off point. “We want to get a gas line shut-off in our kitchen only, so if we do have a fire in the kitchen, we

can shut the gas off and right there only,” Yeary explained. After Yeary finished, Emergency Management Director Tony Liess gave his report, highlighting topics including his training in Puerto Rico, where over 400 volunteers were trained to respond to disasters, monitored severe weather and watched some potential flooding, with a tornado warning occurring on Aug. 11. “Back in July, we had a warning that went off because our siren in Dover,” Liess stated. “The way it's set up is, they put a polygon around that area that is covered by that siren. That polygon actually stretches across the river into Ohio, and so when Ohio activated their warning it automatically tipped off ours. That has been corrected.” Mason County Landfill Manager Travis Cooley then presented the Landfill, Recycling and Garbage Collections reports

and litter abatement update to the fiscal court. According to Cooley, during August, the landfill received 8,656.46 tons of waste valued at \$244,107.39 and pumped 2,043,149 gallons of leche. Additionally, 70,666 pounds were taken in for recycling with 93,060 pounds shipped to International Paper for \$2,363.34. Mason County Garbage Collections collected 395.26 tons of waste with 490 for active waste wheelers. McNeill noted that litter abatement funding grants were increasing. After the treasurer's report, the fiscal court went over August's reports for Tourism, EMS and Permit. The August EMS report stated that there were 276 EMS runs, with 53 runs in Mason County and 223 runs in the City of Maysville. Finally, the fiscal court voted to contribute \$500 to the Buffalo Trace Fire Commissions Fire

School. Commissioner Joe McKay made a motion to approve, with a second made by Com-

missioner Peggy Frame. A roll call vote was taken with a unanimous yes vote, passing the motion.
