Legitimate authority can be:

I. Social and Political
a. traditional or rooted in long-standing customs, traditions, and practices.

b. charismatic or based on the compelling personal appeal, heroism, or perceived extraordinary qualities of a person.

c. rational and legal, grounded in a system of written rules, laws, and institutional procedures.

II. Legal

a. actual, clearly granted

b. apparent-when a person reasonably believes they have permission

III. Expertise and Knowledge

Authority given because the person is believed to be an expert, trusted source, or thought leader.

IV. Government-an organization created to deliver specific public services
