

# Travis Kelce, Brady share stories about Hill

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The New Heights podcast from Chiefs tight end Travis Kelce and his big brother, Jason, has featured a number of Hollywood stars over the past year, along with one notable singer (Taylor Swift).

But for sports fans, the podcast is its best when football players are invited.

In the season finale, which was released Wednesday, seven-time Super Bowl champion Tom Brady joined the show. He shared about when Randy Moss joined the Patriots. Brady talked about what a great receiver Moss was, and Jason Kelce mentioned DeSean Jackson when they played for the Eagles.

Travis Kelce followed by praising former Chiefs receiver Tyreek Hill.

"He didn't have that stride that the two we were just talking about, DeSean and Randy Moss, but his ability to find the ball and to meet it down is second to none too," Kelce said.

Brady then asked if Kelce had a favorite story about Hill. Kelce shared a little behind-the-scenes tale of the immediate impact Hill made at Chiefs practice.

The Chiefs selected Hill in the fifth round of the 2016 NFL Draft. Kelce was going into his fourth season with the Chiefs.

"It's insane ... the first day we got him, it was like a little seven-on-seven in OTAs, and he caught like just like a flat route, like it was like a bubble-slant RPO, and he was the bubble. He caught the bubble, no-

body got within two arms length of him. He just ran down the sideline, and I'm just sitting here like we just got the most electric player in the draft," Kelce said laughing.

"It was insane, dog, and you already know a lot of the practice reps (are) just like what you were saying. Just testing out how far a quarterback can throw it. Like, we can connect down field if he can track it. And seeing the plays that him and (Patrick) Mahomes would make in OTAs or in training camp, and just testing the waters to see how far we could go. I mean, it's insane."

Fans saw that in the preseason game when Mahomes and Hill connected on a 69-yard bomb.

Brady recalled how former Patriots coach Bill Belichick changed his defense because of Hill.

"So we play you guys one year," Brady said of the Chiefs, "and Bill was like, 'All right, the calls on third down are one double Travis, one double 87.' And we didn't double Tyreek, and Tyreek went for like 200-plus that game, and you guys beat us. And Bill came in the next day, says, 'We're doubling Tyreek, we're not gonna let him go for 200 on us.'"

"So it was like back and forth on third down, who we're doubling. And it's kind of cool for us, because you do see, most NFL players are obviously supremely talented, and then every once in a while you see someone who is just a little more talented than everybody else, and you go, 'Man, that is a special talent, that's crazy.'"

# US star Pulisic had microfracture vs. Belgium

U.S. men's national team star Christian Pulisic is expected to be sidelined several weeks with a bone bruise and microfracture in his right leg.

Pulisic was injured during the team's loss to Belgium in the World Cup round of 16 on Monday.

The Athletic first reported the specific injury and expected timeline of recovery for Pulisic, who likely will be able to resume training prior to AC Milan's Serie A opener at Torino on Aug. 23.

With the U.S. trailing 2-1 in its round of 16 match on Monday in Seattle, Pulisic was lining up a shot at the edge of the 18-yard box in the 54th minute. Belgium captain Youri Tielemans stepped between the ball and Pulisic's foot, leading to the American kicking Tielemans' foot.

Pulisic initially stayed down to warrant a stoppage. He attempted to play through the injury but was visibly limping, and was subbed off in the 59th

minute after Belgium took advantage of keeper Matt Freese's blunder to extend their lead to 3-1.

Pulisic, 27, visibly was emotional on the sideline after being subbed off in the 4-1 loss. He finished his second World Cup with one assist in four matches.

"Tough to find the words. I want to start by saying thank you to everyone who believed. The support carried us all the way through," Pulisic wrote Wednesday on Instagram.

"It simply wasn't good enough from us in the end and I wanted to deliver so much more. I still feel blessed to be a part of this team. The memories this summer will last a lifetime. It's just the start for us and for this sport in America."

In the United States' opening match vs. Paraguay, Pulisic exacerbated a calf injury sustained before the World Cup and came off at halftime. He didn't return to action until the second half of the team's group-stage finale vs. Turkey.
