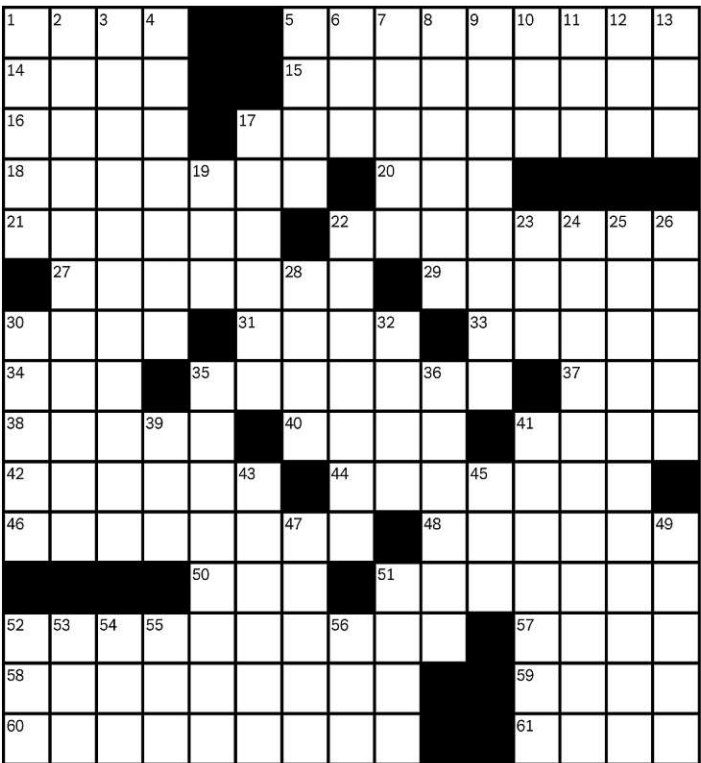

I had the idea that maybe I should travel, too — with my husband and younger kids. The hang-up here is my mom. She will be silently de- astated not to have us around for Christmas. I have siblings, but neither has kids, so “it’s just not the same.”

I guess I’m asking if it’s OK to do what makes me feel better, even if it makes someone else feel worse?

talk about this now. Plus it’s hard to travel over Christmas with a family if you don’t speak of it till Thanksgiving.

I wonder, though, why you don’t think you answered your own ques- tion already, when you answered your kid: You just said your sadness isn’t a reason for someone else not to have adventures. Right? So why doesn’t that apply to you?

Is your oldest child’s adventure more important than yours? Is your mom’s sadness sadder than yours? If so, then does that make you more respon- sible for it?

These may sound like rhetorical ques- tions, but they’re not. They’re the issues your decisions, planning and emotional resolve hinge on.

You apparently don’t equate the family travel you have in mind to young adult travel in its adventure value. You also apparently don’t see your siblings as compan- ionship enough for your mother on a major holi- day — nor do you account for their or your mother’s agency in making their own holiday plans. You see yourself as the party responsible if not for

everyone’s holiday satis- faction then certainly for your mother’s.

These are the assump- tions to challenge now, because they’re bigger than holidays. Even if you decide not to change anything about this Christmas, it’s worth the effort to dismantle the cage you’ve built for yourself with your default attitude — toward family and wherever else you’ve let this happen.

Here’s a verbal short- cut for rethinking norms, family and otherwise: Is feeling worse the worst thing?

You started your letter with a perfect example. You will feel worse for not having your oldest around this Christmas, yes. But is feeling worse the worst thing? No. A lot of things are worse, such as keeping your kid on a guilt leash just because you formed a 20-year home-for-Christ- mas habit.

You don’t want your mom to be sad about not seeing her grandkids this Christmas, of course. But is feeling worse the worst thing? Or is it even worse to keep fighting the inevitability of change, when we can find a loving, realistic and good-natured

LSU QB Leavitt doubtful for game with Ole Miss

Though he did not ap- pear to suffer an injury in last Saturday’s win over Louisiana Tech, quar- terback Sam Leavitt is listed as doubtful for No. 7 LSU’s rivalry showdown at No. 8 Ole Miss on Sat- urday.

According to On3, Leavitt is dealing with a sore throwing shoulder and has been limited in practice this week. The Tigers are closely monitoring their starting quarterback, per the report.

The Arizona State trans- fer spoke to reporters after the 45-14 home victory and did not appear to be dealing with an ailment. “I’m just focusing on tonight, getting better, getting the body healthy,” Leavitt said when asked whether he was looking forward to facing Ole Miss. “But no, it’s going to be an incredible opportu- nity.”

Leavitt was slated to speak with the media Tuesday about the key SEC clash against Ole Miss, according to an LSU spokesperson, but he was not present at the session. At a Monday news con- ference, LSU coach Lane Kiffin did not mention any information about Lea- vitt’s health status.

Under the SEC’s avail- ability policy, a player has a 25% chance to play and is “unlikely to play due to significant concerns.”

SEC football teams face penalties that range from \$25,000 to \$100,000 for late or inaccurate avail- ability reports. It is at the discretion of SEC Com- missioner Greg Sankey whether to impose these penalties.

LSU quarterback Sam Leavitt is reportedly dealing with a sore throwing shoulder and has been limited in practice this week.

Leavitt’s teammate and the Tigers’ leading tackler, TJ Dottery, is also ques- tionable.

A two-year starter and Big 12 Freshman of the Year at Arizona State, Leavitt transferred to LSU after the school hired Kiffin.

After throwing for a touchdown and rushing for two more in a blowout season-opening win over Clemson, Leavitt threw for a score and ran for three more in the victory over Louisiana Tech, but he tossed three intercep- tions.

In two games with LSU, Leavitt has completed 41 of 66 passes for 574 yards, two touchdowns and four interceptions. He has also rushed for 135 yards and five scores.

If Leavitt isn’t available to play, either freshman Husan Longstreet or soph- omore Landen Clark will start. In two games, Clark has completed 7 of 10 passes for 109 yards, one touchdown, and no in- terceptions. Longstreet has attempted one pass, a 33-yard completion.

At the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council meeting on September 10, 2026 Ordinances 082-2026 through 084-2026; 086-2026; and 087-2026 were enacted related to: (1) changing the zone from a Single Family Residential (R-1C) zone to a Corridor Business (B-3) zone, for 4,912 net (6,047 gross) acres, for property located at 1770 and 1800 Harrodsburg Rd; (2) authorizing the issuance of its Various Purpose General Obligation Bonds, Series 2026B, in one or more sub-series, in an aggregate principal amount of \$9,740,000 (which amount may be increased by an amount of up to ten percent (10%) or decreased by an unlimited amount); approving a form of Series 2026B Bonds; authorizing designated officers to execute and deliver the Series 2026B Bonds; authorizing and directing the filing of notice with the State Local Debt Officer; providing for the payment and security of the Series 2026B Bonds; maintaining a Sinking Fund; creating a Bond Payment Fund for the Series 2026B Bonds; authorizing acceptance of the bid(s) of the bond purchaser of the Series 2026B Bonds; and repealing inconsistent ordinances; (3) amending Section 16-1(c)(19), Section 16-1(f)(70), and Section 17-1(1) of the Code of Ordinances of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, adopting and incorporating the Complete Streets Design Manual as an engineering manual for infrastructure development in Lexington-Fayette County; (4) amending certain of the Budgets of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government to reflect current requirements for municipal expenditures, and appropriating and re-appropriating funds, FY 2027, Schedule No. 6; (5) amending certain of the Budgets of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government to correct funds for purchase orders rolling from FY 2026 into FY 2027, and appropriating and re-appropriating funds, Schedule No. 5; and (6) creating Chapter 28 of the Code of Ordinances of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government (Privilege Fees for Public Infrastructure Improvements), as follows: adopting definitions for privilege fee, participating owner, non-participating owner, public infrastructure, shared public infrastructure, acreage, and interest; authorizing the allocation of costs of construction of shared public improvements to non-participating owners in the form of privilege fees; authorizing the execution of Privilege Fee Agreements by the Mayor or the Chief Administrative Officer as Mayor’s designee for construction of shared public infrastructure and for reimbursement of costs associated therewith from privilege fees remitted by non-participating owners; requiring competitive bidding procedures for construction of shared public infrastructure unless waived for good cause shown; providing for notice to all non-participating owners and a public hearing regarding proposed construction of shared public improvements and the allocation of costs to non-participating owners by way of privilege fees; establishing minimum requirements for Privilege Fee Agreements; authorizing administrative fees; and authorizing the collection of interest on privilege fees.
