senger side before correcting and getting back on the roadway.

Purvis initiated a traffic stop on Southdale Drive, the citation states.

The citation claims Lyman was visibly disoriented and confused, allegedly stating multi-

ple times that he needed to get his grandson out of the vehicle, although no one else was with him.

Lyman allegedly failed multiple field sobriety tests.

A witness stopped and provided the deputy with two videos allegedly showing Lyman driving on the wrong side of the road and nearly striking multiple vehicles, according to the citation.

Lyman was transported to Saint Joseph Mount Sterling for a blood draw, the citation states, before being taken to the Montgomery County Regional Jail.

He was released from the jail at 6 p.m. June 13 after someone posted a \$2,500 cash bond, Chief Deputy Jailer Beth Wiloughby told the Advocate.

At 10:21 p.m. June 13,

Deputy Michael Grapner claims he observed Lyman turn left in the same pickup previously mentioned out of the Arlington neighborhood onto Old Owingsville Road where he reportedly went into the opposing lane of traffic and almost struck a vehicle.

Lyman allegedly swerved his vehicle into someone's yard before coming to a stop after

Grapner initiated his emergency equipment, according to the citation.

The citation claims an ignition interlock device in the vehicle was allegedly tampered with to allow someone to start and activate the vehicle.

Lyman allegedly stated to authorities he was more high and intoxicated than he was during the previous traffic stop, according to the citation.

He allegedly failed multiple field sobriety tests, the citation states.

Lyman was transport-

ed back to Saint Joseph Mount Sterling for a blood draw before being returned to the MCRJ, according to the citation.

At the jail, Lyman took a urine test per jail policy, the citation claims.

Lyman allegedly tested positive for amphetamine, buprenorphine, methamphetamine, morphine/opiates, oxycodone and marijuana, the citation claims.

ly showed the child's genitalia warranted so.

Mt. Sterling Police Officer Thomas Wilson said in his testimony June 18 at the preliminary hearing that Davis allegedly had pornography on his phone that included what appeared to be some "very young" individuals.

The search history on Davis's phone reportedly showed videos and photos of legal pornography, but the officer said he was still going through data as part of the investigation to determine if there was any child pornography, Wilson testified.

Wilson said Davis' wife, Cheryl, first went to police June 6 to report possible alleged child porn on her husband's phone, according to the officer's testimony.

Wilson testified he then got a search warrant for two of Davis' phones. He claims a third phone belonging to Glenn Davis is still missing.

On the phones that were seized were allegedly video and pictures of a 2-year-old family member reportedly taken by Cheryl Davis with "his head down, butt up" dancing on a bed while listening to "Baby Shark," according to the officer's testimony.

The photos were allegedly shot at a close angle showing the child's anus and genitalia.

Glenn Davis' attorney, public defender Chris Crigler, claims that since there was no sexual performance reportedly involved, the alleged offense didn't violate the statute, which is possession of matter portraying a sexual performance of a minor under 12.

County Attorney Keith Craycraft argued the alleged conduct of showing the child's genitalia, combined with the reported presence of pornography, met the standard of the statute.

District Judge Don Blair agreed and bound the case over for the grand jury.

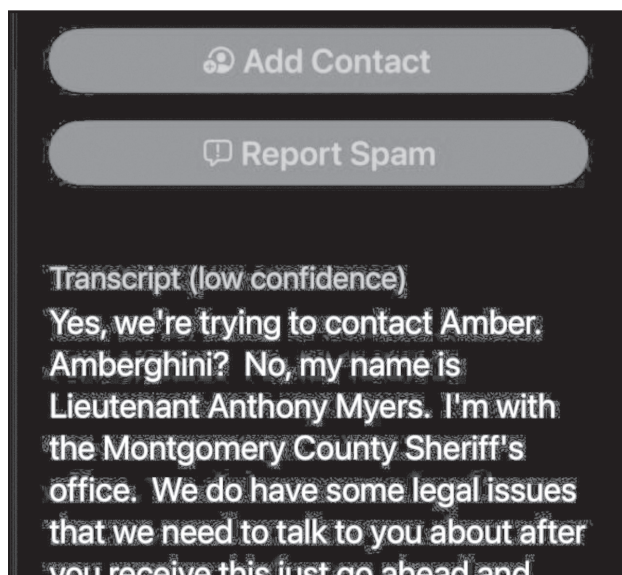
Crigler also asked Blair to allow Glenn Davis to be released on a \$25,000 surety bond, the same as his wife.

Craycraft claimed Glenn and Cheryl Davis are in two completely different situations. Glenn Davis has also been charged with being a felon in possession of a firearm (he allegedly was found later with four firearms) and he's reportedly a potential risk to reoffend.

Wilson testified that Glenn Davis has a previous conviction for grand larceny out of Florida.

Blair declined to modify bond.

With this registration, supervisors can quickly check the area for potential cameras that might hold crucial evidence, saving valuable time. Often, time is lost checking properties with non-working cameras or when owners can't be reached urgently.

Rest assured, this program does NOT allow the police dept. access to your system. It's completely voluntary, with information kept securely within the MSPD and accessible only to supervisors. Your details won't be sold or shared with anyone, a release said.

Judge Don Blair appointed the public defender's office to represent Cheryl. Co-counsel will have to be assigned since public defender Chris Crigler is representing Glenn Davis, the judge said. Public defender Jacob Cales will represent Cheryl Davis.

Judge Don Blair scheduled a preliminary hearing in Cheryl's case for June 23.

At the hearing the judge will hear evi-

dence in the case and determine if probable cause exists to send the case to a grand jury for possible indictment.

Crigler, who stood in for Cheryl Davis for purposes of arraignment, asked Blair to release Cheryl on a surety bond. He said she had people willing to post such a bond.

Blair granted the request.

As part of the bond, those individuals do not have to post any money, but could be on the line for up to \$25,000 if Cheryl fails to make court appearances.
