Proposed Tax Notification for Non-Recallable Rates

The Owen County Board of Education is proposing a general fund tax levy of 74.6 cents on real property and 74.6 cents on personal property.

The General Fund tax levied in fiscal year 2026 was 71.3 cents on real property and 71.3 cents on personal property and produced revenue of \$5,433,352.71. The proposed General Fund tax rate of 74.6 cents on real property and 74.6 cents on personal property is expected to produce \$6,095,010.98. Of this amount, \$648,058.38 is from new and personal property. The compensating tax for 2027 is 71.1 cents on real property and 71.1 cents on personal property and is expected to produce \$5,809,920.72.

The proposed rate is expected to generate more revenue than received in the preceding year. The general areas to which revenue of \$661,658.27 above 2026 revenue is to be allocated are as follows: Cost of collections, \$23,819.70; building fund, \$0; instruction, \$637,838.57; transportation, \$0; and maintenance of plant, \$0.
