



Settle signs to play football at Gardner-Webb

SHEPHERDSVILLE — For a guy who always dreamed of playing collegiate football, having to mull over offers from 14 universities could become a daunting task.

When it was all said and done, the senior at Christian Academy of Louisville opted to sign on the dotted line with Division I Gardner-Webb University.

"I love how beautiful and well-appointed the university is... the location, the academic offerings and the coaching staff," said Jackson Settle, the son of Garry and Kellee Settle.

The football player's path began at the age of seven years old with the Greater Bullitt

County Youth Football League. Playing five years with the Cedar Grove Vikings, Settle then played a couple of years with the Central Middle School team. His high school career took him to Christian Academy.

He also played basketball for a number of years through the Bullitt County YMCA, AAU basketball and three years with Bernheim Middle, including time with Bullitt Central in his eighth-grade year.

But, knowing that football would be his ticket to college, Settle opted to focus on the gridiron sport while at CAL.

While many freshmen may find it hard to get onto the field their first year, Settle said he

will be the hardest working player on the team to be a major contributor for Gardner-Webb.

"Playing Division I football on a full scholarship has been a dream of mine since youth league," said Settle, who has already been rooted on by his older siblings, Garry and Austin.

Being blessed with many great coaches in his past, Settle gave a special shout out to Domenico Pancotto, his late coach with the Cedar Grove Vikings. He said Coach D. was his biggest fan and one who always pushed him to be the best person possible through his positivity.

Third-party deals that blow past college \$20.5M cap are not what they expected

The onset of \$30 million football rosters funded mostly by companies providing third-party payments to players on behalf of their schools is within the rules but "has not sort of matched" the system some of its founders intended, the head of the College Sports Commission said Tuesday.

Bryan Seeley delivered an update on the CSC's progress over the last two months. While he was bullish about the new agency's ability to analyze deals quickly, he said the influx of third-party deals that help schools blow past the \$20.5 million salary cap they're allowed to pay players directly has led to increased review times.

The CSC's new numbers, updated through February, included a 65% increase over the preceding two months in the volume of the third-party deals, which are sometimes known as associated deals, among schools in the Power Four conferences.

Seeley said those figures led him to believe that most schools are trying to follow the rules by submitting their deals for review to the CSC, which is tasked with making sure they are not simple pay-for-play contracts but have a "valid business purpose" and are priced fairly.

He also said he had been

told that "there was a belief that perhaps up to 90% of deals flowing through the system would do so automatically that would not need any kind of human review. "It must have been based on an assumption that this would be a somewhat organic market with a lot of not associated deals," he said. "And that is turning out to be not the case."

Those associated deals have brought the CSC under scrutiny for lag time in approving contracts. More importantly, they speak to wider concerns that the cost of populating competitive college rosters has spiraled out of control less than a year into the system that was activated by the House settlement — the endgame in a lawsuit that allows schools to share revenue

directly with players, then augment that through third-party deals.

The discussion has reached as far as the White House, where last week President Donald Trump held a "summit" with sports leaders to discuss ways of reining in costs.

Trump has promised an executive order this week that will address issues in an industry where, he said, "the amount of money being spent and lost by otherwise very successful schools is astounding, just in a short period of time. And it's only going to get worse."

Seeley, still focused on standing up an agency that will play a massive role in policing college sports, said he did not want to delve into whether the current system is sustainable.





 ORDINANCE NO. 2026-01**

AN ORDINANCE FINALLY ANNEXING APPROXIMATELY 1.032 +/- ACRES OF UNINCORPORATED TERRITORY ADJOINING THE CITY OF HILLVIEW, BULLITT COUNTY, KENTUCKY WITH THE CONSENT OF THE LANDOWNERS.

WHEREAS, the City of Hillview has authority pursuant to KRS 81A.400, et seq., to annex unincorporated territory into its city limits; and

WHEREAS, the City of Hillview is ready and able to immediately begin furnishing municipal services to the area upon annexation; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to KRS 81A.412, the record owners of the territory to be annexed have given prior written consent to the annexation; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to KRS 81A.412(2), the City of Hillview has provided written notice to the Bullitt County Fiscal Court of its intent to annex the subject area through the publication of Resolution No. 2026-01, adopted on January 5, 2026, at least forty-five (45) days prior to the final adoption of this Ordinance:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HILL VIEW, KENTUCKY:

SECTION ONE - ANNEXATION

The City of Hillview does hereby annex certain unincorporated territory, described in the records of the Bullitt County Clerk in Deed Book 1117, Page 633 and otherwise identified by the Office of the Bullitt County Property Valuation Administrator as Map #034-SE0-20-004, into the City of Hillview and such territory shall now become a part of the City for all purposes under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

SECTION TWO - CONSENT

The owners of record of the territory to be annexed have given prior written consent to this annexation.

SECTION THREE - FINDINGS

The City finds that the property described above is adjacent to the City of Hillview and is of an urban character, suitable for development purposes without unreasonable delay, and does hereby declare it desirable to annex the same into the City of Hillview.

SECTION FOUR - EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall become effective upon its publication.

SECTION FIVE - REPEAL


All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance or any part of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.


