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and 14 doubles. Overall, GRC has a .434 batting average with 52 home runs, 20 triples and 115 doubles. Amazingly, both GRC and Bullitt East have the exact same batting average this season, .434. That mark ties the teams for the fourth best in the state. Bullitt East has six starters batting at least .440. Mingus leads the way at .495 while Alivia Cooper stands at .476, Allie Carter .474 and Payton Holt at .470. Kinnely Murphy bats .467 while Mollie Johnston hits at a .440 clip. Bullitt East has a 32-4 record this season. All nine players that start in the batting order have played in all 36 games this spring (OK, the four seniors and Ryleigh Watrous did not play in the 18-0 win over Moore, but they all could

have played that day). Ella King does play in the outfield (with Allie Carter most of the time just hitting) and has missed one game. In the circle, Bullitt East has a combined 1.93 ERA. Watrous is at 2.63 while Mingus has a 1.19 ERA. Bullitt East is sixth in the state in runs scored per game at 10.85 while GRC is third at 11.19 runs a game. The Lady Chargers have an average winning margin of 8.89 while GRC's winning margin is 8.28.

SOUTH WARREN AND HIGHLANDS

By the mid-point of the regular season, South Warren became the odds-on favorite to win the state championship after the Spartans returned from a spring break trip to Florida and stopped in Alabama and beat the number one ranked team in the country, Orange Beach, 6-1 on the team's home field.

Then South Warren rolled through Kentucky undefeated this spring. Now, the Lady Spartans stand at 43-0. However, in recent weeks a slight opening has appeared for opposing teams. South Warren 'only' beat Barren County 4-0 in the championships game of the Fourth Region Tournament. After beating Oldham County 12-0 in the opening game of the state tournament, (BE beat Oldham 11-1 during the season) the Lady Spartans were certainly on the ropes on Saturday, needing eight innings before a walk-off two-run home run gave the team a 4-3 win over Madison Central. South Warren had not trailed against a Kentucky team this season until twice against Madison Central. Two years ago, South Warren lost in the semifinals of the state tournament and last year lost in the first-round. Still, the Lady Spartans are

the top-ranked team in Kentucky with five Division-One signees and a University of Kentucky commit. That group includes a two-time Kentucky Gatorade Softball Player of the Year. One poll has South Warren as the number one team in the country. The top threat for South Warren is senior McLaine Hudson who has signed with Florida State and is the two-time Gatorade Player of the Year for Kentucky. Hudson leads the state with a .756 average, 26 home runs, 93 hits and 102 runs. She is the lead-off hitter for the Lady Spartans. However, the player that hit the two-run home run in the bottom of the eighth with no outs was senior Layla Ogden, a Western Kentucky signee. The Lady Spartans have four players hitting over .500 this season with Hudson and Ogden being joined by Parker Willoughby and Hadley Borders. All four of those

players are seniors. Overall, South Warren has a .485 team batting average this season. Courtney Norwood, a junior who has committed to the University of Kentucky, was the starting pitcher against Madison Central but in the fifth inning Ogden moved into the circle at a key time. Norwood later returned to pitch and got credit for the win. South Warren overall has a 1.02 earned run average. The team has not allowed more than four runs in any game this spring. Highlands has a 35-6 record this season. The Bluebirds are riding a 19-game winning streak into the match with South Warren. Three of those losses came on a spring break trip to Florida where Highlands lost games to Assumption (1-0), Oldham County (15-5) and Mercy (2-1) on consecutive days. Highlands defeated Ryle 9-

2 to win the 9th Region title. The Bluebirds opened the state tournament with a 3-0 win over South Laurel and then beat North Hardin 3-2 in the quarterfinals on Saturday in eight innings. There is no doubt that Highlands will send senior Kaitlyn Dixon to the circle in the first semifinal as she has pitched 202 of her teams 241 innings this spring. Dixon has started 33 games and has a 30-3 record with a 0.66 ERA. The leading hitter for Highlands is senior Cam Markus who has a .475 batting average. Layla Zepf, a sophomore, is hitting .457 with 59 hits while driving in 39 runs. Kate Class, another sophomore, is hitting .410 with 43 hits. Senior Payton Brown has half of her team's home runs with nine.

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run when she singled through the left side of the infield. Bullitt East kept the heat on as Katlyn McDonald singled, scoring Mingus' courtesy runner, June Pile. Following the second out of the inning, Holt singled back up the middle, loading the bases again. That brought the top of the lineup to the plate again and Cooper answered with a solid single to the right side. Watrous and McDonald scored on the play and when the ball got loose at third,

Holt was motioned home, but was out at the plate. The 5-0 lead was more than Mingus needed. The pitcher did hit the first batter in the sixth, but then got a pair of fly balls before ending the inning on a strikeout. In the seventh, there was a ground out and a single before the Giddens fly ball was the second out. A fly ball to Willis in right field then ended the game. "My rise ball," Mingus said when asked about her best pitch in this game. "Really, they were taking the bait (chasing pitches out of the zone). I threw a lot of bait and today it worked." "I was definitely less nervous,"

Mingus said of her second straight trip to the state tournament. "I was not worried about Assumption. I knew if we had our confidence and played out game that they did not have a chance." The final numbers showed Bullitt East with the nine hits with two each coming from Cooper, Watrous and Holt. The other three hits came from Carter, Murphy and McDonald. The only extra base hit was a double by Cooper. Pierce was preaching "one down, three to go," following the win. "Those four seniors are our leaders," Pierce said of Cooper, Johnston, Mingus and McDonald.

"The motivation is from what we have learned in the past. I just want them to stay within themselves and let other teams figure us out. "We were just waiting for them to start hitting," the coach added. Some of the players did stay in Lexington later in the day and attended the baseball game with Bullitt East taking on Trinity. Bullitt East is the only school in the state this spring to have both its baseball and softball teams reach the state tournaments. Still, the players all slept in their own beds on Friday night before getting together for some batting practice on Saturday before leaving

for Lexington and the 5 p.m. game on Saturday against Hazard. It is hard to imagine two teams in Kentucky knowing less about each other. The two programs have never met in fast-pitch softball and they did not play any common opponents this season. Hazard, the Lady Bulldogs, entered the game with a 24-12 record. The team broke a 1-1 tie in rolling to the 7-2 win over Ballard Memorial. The Lady Bulldogs won the 14th Region title with a 2-1 victory over Letcher County Central after turning back Estill County (1-0) and Breathitt County (12-1) in the opening round games.

ORDINANCE NO. 2026-04

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE CRITERIA FOR THE FEE REQUIREMENTS FOR FOOD TRUCK VENDORS SEEKING TO ACQUIRE A BUSINESS LICENSE TO DO BUSINESS IN THE CITY OF LEBANON JUNCTION, BULLITT COUNTY, KENTUCKY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEBANON JUNCTION, BULLITT COUNTY, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION ONE: The fee for any food truck vendor wishing to do business within the City of Lebanon Junction shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00) per day for the first two days the food truck is in operation, totaling a fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00); these two days must be in the same calendar year. The fee for the third day the food truck is in operation is one hundred dollars (\$100.00);

SECTION TWO: Once the full two hundred dollars (\$200.00) has been paid by a food truck vendor, said food truck vendor will have a one-year pass, that is good for the rest of the calendar year in which they completed payment, to operate in the City of Lebanon Junction; subject to reasonable time, place and manner restrictions. Said one-year pass does not mean one year from the time the payment is completed, only until the calendar year that payment was made in is complete.

SECTION THREE: This Ordinance and the criteria set forth within does not apply to any food trucks that do business within the City of Lebanon Junction during any Festival sanctioned by the City of Lebanon Junction.

SECTION FOUR: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance or any part of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION FIVE: Should any section, clause, line, paragraph or part of this Ordinance be held unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the same shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance.
