

Tough week for girls' soccer teams

SHEPHERDSVILLE – Everybody knew that the Bullitt Central girls' soccer team could win high-scoring games.

In three previous victories, the team had wins of 8-0, 5-0 and 8-0. The Lady Chargers did win the season-opener by a 4-3 margin but there was a 2-1 setback to Mercy.

So, against Ballard at home on Wednesday, Bullitt Central battled a team that could challenge them. The Lady Cougars responded with a strong effort and with some big saves from junior goalie Malia Hagan, the Lady Cougars battled to a 1-1 tie against the Seventh Region power.

Ballard already has a 3-0 victory over Bullitt East this season, so this was a confidence builder for the Lady Cougars heading into a huge battle against the Lady Chargers on Monday in a Labor Day match at 6 p.m. that will for all intents and purposes secure the number one seed and two home matches in the Super Regional in October.

Both of the goals in this game were scored in the first half. Bullitt Central equaled the Lady Bruins when Rosalyn Marcum slipped a pass to Savannah McKendree who directed it past goalie Keltie Wallace.

Bullitt Central could not put a lot of pressure on Wallace in the second half. It was a different story on the other

end as Hagan had to make a pair of impressive saves on shots that were headed into the goal. For the game, Hagan stopped 16 of the 17 shots that Ballard sent her way.

The match against Ballard was actually the only contest that Bullitt Central played last week. A match against Fern Creek on Thursday was canceled.

After two matches earlier this week, the Lady Cougars

will be at home on Saturday for an 11 a.m. match against 23rd District rival Moore. That will be the final tune-up for the maroon and gray before the clash with Bullitt East on Monday.

Bullitt Central started this week with a 4-1-1 record.

Bullitt East The season got off to a sour start for the Lady Chargers and so far, it has not gotten any better for the three-time defending Sixth

Region champions.

At the start of this week, the red and gold had a 1-6 record with many of the losses coming in 'short-time' games. Bullitt East is suffering a little from a very difficult schedule set for last season when they were

really good, but this year's return games has the younger and less experienced team learning some hard lessons.

The problem is obvious. The Lady Chargers cannot score. In the six losses, the red and gold have failed to score a goal in any of those contests. Three times Bullitt East has lost 8-0 games that were stopped early.

Bullitt East only played once last week, an 8-0 setback to a traditionally strong South Oldham team. Two matches that they could have won last week, against Central and Southern, were either canceled or postponed.

(The match against Southern has to be played as both teams are in the 23rd District. It was rescheduled for Wednesday of this week but has already been postponed again as Jefferson County Public Schools have canceled all outdoor activities on Wednesday and Thursday because of expected high temperatures.)

Still, Bullitt East is set to play a big game on Monday in Shepherdsville against Bullitt Central. That will be the first meeting between the two programs since the Lady Chargers beat the Lady Cougars in the champion-

ship game of last seasons' Sixth Region tournament.

That game has a 6 p.m. start time for the varsity contest.

North Bullitt Coach Amber Mink's team played twice last week, dropping both matches.

On Monday, the Lady Eagles were outscored at Male by an 8-0 count. It did get somewhat better on Saturday as the green and gold battled LaRue County in Hodgenville before falling 3-1.

The long goal for North Bullitt was scored by Kaydence Lindsey. Keara Payne was in the goal for the Lady Eagles but did allow the three goals while making 11 saves.

That action dropped North Bullitt to 2-6 as they started action this week. After playing Fairdale on Monday of this week, the Lady Eagles will take a big mid-season break as they will not play again until Tuesday at home against Moore. The next day they will face Central at home before traveling to Fern Creek on Thursday.

The break comes at a perfect time as high temperatures this week are going to cancel a lot of outside events in the area.
