Whitley County captures Kentucky 2A Classic crown in five-set thriller

OWENSBORO — Whitley County is bringing home a state championship.

The Lady Colonels battled through five sets Saturday, outlasting Lexington Catholic, 23-25, 25-19, 19-25, 25-13, 15-13, to capture the Kentucky

2A Classic Volleyball State Championship.

It was a championship performance built on resilience.

Whitley County dropped the opening set, 25-23, before answering with a 25-19 victory in the second. Lexington Catholic regained control with a 25-19 win in the third, put-

ting the Lady Colonels one set away from defeat.

Instead of folding, Whitley responded.

The Lady Colonels dominated the fourth set, racing to a 25-13 victory to force a decisive fifth set. With the state championship on the line, Whitley County finished the job, edging Lexington Catholic

15-13 in the tiebreaker to secure the title.

For Whitley County head coach David Halcomb, the championship was the culmination of countless hours of work by his players and coaching staff.
