## Cottrell hits 1,000 Career Points, Jones wins 100th as HC downs Middlesboro

History was in the making at Middlesboro High School on Friday as Harlan County senior guard Reggie Cottrell scored his 1,000th career point and HC coach Kyle Jones collecting his 100th win.

The Black Bears jumped out to a first half lead and slipped by the Yellow Jackets with a 69-61 win.

Looking back three years ago, it was a team that featured a 3,000-point scorer (Trent Noah), a 2,000-point scorer (Maddox Huff) and Cottrell's 1,000th.

Cottrell poured in 36 points as Harlan County improved to 14-8 overall and 3-1 in district play. He also grabbed 10 rebounds. Junior guard Trenton Cole scored 16 points. Kaden Jones and Landon Brock each added six points. Brady Smith contributed three while Brennan Blevins had two.

Senior guard Joseph Killion scored 19 points in for the 11-12 Yellow Jackets. Junior guard Bryson Brooks finished with 18 points. Aiden Larew added nine points and a team-high seven rebounds.

The Black Bears jumped out to a 24-11 advantage after one quarter and extended the lead to 39-22 at halftime.

Middlesboro fought back in

the second half, outscoring HC in the third and fourth periods.

Killion scored five baskets in the third quarter as the Jackets cut the deficit to 54-41.

Middlesboro got as close as eight points in the final frame as the Black Bears claimed the district victory.

It was Harlan County's 14th straight win over Middlesboro. The Bears have a 41-8 record all-time against the Jackets.

Middlesboro struggled shooting 3-pointers (two of 16) and free throws (nine of 18), plus turning the ball over 12 times.

HCHS nailed seven 3-pointers as Cottrell hit three. Jones and Cole added two apiece.

The Bears connected on 14 of 20 free throws and made 24 of 44 from the field for 55 percent.

Middlesboro hosted Bell County on Monday and traveled to Barbourville on Tuesday.

The Yellow Jackets will host Clay County on Friday before visiting Somerset on Saturday afternoon.

The Black Bears were scheduled to play at Berea High School on Saturday to face Madison Southern in the Bill Smallwood Classic.

Harlan County plays host to Pineville on Thursday, visits Harlan on Friday and travels to Breathitt County on Monday.
