Carroll wins 4 events, Trimble 3 at Henry track invite

Carroll County and Trimble County both competed in a track & field invitational at Henry County on Saturday.

Carroll County won four individual events and Trimble County won three.

Carroll's Helany Gutierrez won the girls long jump at 13 feet, 8.75 inches, Jocelinne Rodriguez Tinoco won the girls triple jump at 24 feet, 8.25 inches, the girls 800-meter relay in 2:06.16, and Dillon Davis won the boys javelin at 127 feet, 7 inches.

Trimble's Autumn Kaltenbach won the girls discus at 73 feet, 2 inches and girls shot at 24 feet, 3.75 inches and Avery Stockdale won the girls 1600 run in 6:33.04.

Other top finishes for Carroll's girls were: Adree Dermon, second, 100 dash, 14.37 and second, 400 dash, 1:14.94; Amabelle Tanzilla, second, discus, 70-9 and second, shot put, 24-3.25; 400 relay, second, 1:02.11; and Gutierrez, third, 200 dash, 29.59.

Other top finishes for Carroll's boys were: Trey Miller, second, long jump, 17-0; 800 relay, second, 1:42.74; 3200 relay, second, 10:51.41; Joshua Anderson, third, 100 dash, 11.70; Devin Mejia Perez, third, 300 hurdles, 54.30; and Noah Frye, third, triple jump, 28-7.5.

Trimble County lost all three games it played in pool play at the All "A" Classic Softball State Finals in Owensboro on Saturday.

The Raiders lost 12-2 to Jackson County, 9-1 to Cumberland County and 11-1 to Bethlehem.

Ava Newton and Alyssa Ritchie each had a hit and an RBI and Tynlee Walls had a double in the loss to Jackson County. Ritchie gave up four earned runs in five innings for the loss.

Ritchie had two hits and an RBI and Newton and Sarah Kate Chilton each had a hit in the loss to Cumberland. Ritchie allowed just two earned runs but took the loss.

Noble took the loss after allowing four earned runs on three hits in two and a third innings. Rose allowed one earned run in four and two-thirds in relief, the first earned run she has allowed this season in 25 innings.

The reason for destruction of the above listed items is because they are no longer needed to provide educational services and/or it has been more than (3) years since the individual has received special education services provided by Trimble County Public School District.

*The district may maintain a permanent record, without time limitation, of a student's name, address, phone number, his/her grades, attendance record, classes attended, and grade level completed. The school is required to maintain records for a minimum of three (3) years from the date the child no longer receives special education and related services. After three (3) years, all special education records will be destroyed.

 ORDINANCE UPDATING PAY/CLASSIFICATION PLAN

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Carrollton recognizes that the city's pay/classification plan must be updated from time to time in order to remain current and to maintain an effective and efficient work force;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council, City of Carrollton, Commonwealth of Kentucky:

(1) That the authorized positions and assigned grade be revised as follows:

(3) This ordinance shall become effective after two readings and publication requirements have been met. After a reading in full on the 13th day of April, 2026, followed by a second reading in full on the 27th day of April, 2026, and on motion made by Councilman Hill, seconded by Councilwoman Hays, the Ordinance was adopted by a vote of 5 ayes and 0 nays.
