A Tribute to Charles Mattox - Heaven is a lot like Kentucky
THE TREMBLING OF HEAVEN AND EARTH

Easter Sunday, April 6-7, 1862

Lt. Lot D. Young, a Nicholas County native and Confederate officer, stood in awe of his surroundings and marveled at what he beheld.

He was 20-years-old and was soon to enter his first military battle of the Great War For Southern Independence, as he and his fellow Confederate soldiers called their blossoming struggle that would forever be known as the American Civil War.

Young was an original charter member of the "Flat Rock Grays," a Kentucky National Guard unit located in Nicholas County that formed two years prior to the Civil War. The unit would largely keep its same local roster, but would change the name of the unit to Company H, 4th Kentucky Regiment, Confederate States of America.

Lt. Young marveled as he looked out on the mass of soldiers that occupied the heights surrounding Pittsburgh Landing, near the Tennessee River. His unit was formed to one side of a small structure known as the Shiloh Church.

Young and his fellow Nicholas County neighbors would soon be entering into the first major battle of the war, which would become known as the Battle of Shiloh.

Young later said that his hair stood on ends to such a great degree when the enemy soldiers pointed their rifles at his company that it seemed as if his cap was being lifted off of his head.

He also wrote of using the bayonet.

"My, my; oh Lord; but the cold chills darted up and down my spinal col-

umn as I contemplated the use of the bayonet. Now if there is any scene upon the battle-field more exciting and more terrifying than the glimmer and glitter of a fixed bayonet in the hands of a desperate and determined enemy, pointed directly at your throat or your stomach, I have never seen it."

Lt. Lot D. Young wrote those words several years after the war ended. The quote and others herein come from a book published by Young entitled "Reminiscences of a soldier of the Orphan Brigade."

On the first day of the Battle of Shiloh, the Confederates won an enormously lopsided victory, and nearly pushed the Union soldiers into the river.

Young recorded the triumphant moment as the day's hostilities ended as he and the soldiers with him unleashed that famous cry that would become known throughout time simply as "The Rebel Yell."

"Why, we made the very Heaven and earth tremble with our triumphant shouts. And... the routed enemy trembled also," Young wrote in his publication.

Finally, and mercifully, the battle ended as dusk fell across the field of battle.

"The Hornets Nest" and "The Peach Orchard" would be names of hostile bits of the Shiloh landscape that would also be remembered throughout time during the battle, and they marked the apex of the violence that swirled around the Shiloh Church.

The screams of the wounded filled the night air on the first night, and while many of the wounded

cried out for water, surely God heard their pitiful wails, for the heavens opened up and a torrent of rain fell upon both armies.

Lightning flashes revealed vultures feasting among the dead, who remained on the battlefield between the two armies.

The second day saw a massive re-enforcement effort by the Union army, and the Confederates suffered terribly on that second day, with the Orphan Brigade holding the line at dusk until all of the other units could safely retreat. The horrific losses endured by the Orphans were unimaginable.

The Orphan Brigade was so named according to some accounts, because they were forced from their own state of Kentucky and were thus Orphans.

The dead and dying were so numerous on the Shiloh battlefield that General Ulysses S. Grant, who commanded the Union forces, would later record that a man could walk in any direction a great distance from the center of the battlefield stepping on the bodies of the dead without their boots ever touching the ground, such was the intensity and fury of the violence.

Young could never bring himself to speak publicly of the carnage he witnessed that God-awful second day and his publication only briefly mentions the waste of human life.

"I might speak more in detail of this last day's bloody work and describe more at length many of the horrible sights witnessed and the terrible suffering of our wounded in their transfer to Corinth during the next three days over almost im-

passable roads - the most horrible the mind could possibly picture, exposed to the almost continuous downpour of rain and the awful, awful sadness that filled our hearts in the loss of so many of our comrades, kinsmen and school-fellow friends and the further deep humiliation of final defeat, but the story would be too horrible and sad to elaborate."

The death toll speaks volumes.

There were 1,700 soldiers killed on the Union side, and as many on the Confederate side, and over 8,000 wounded on each side for a staggering casualty count of 20,000. Each army also had thousands taken prisoner and missing in action.

Young actively served the Confederate cause until near the very end of the war, when he was severely wounded while assisting a dying friend at the Battle of Jonesboro in Georgia. After convalescing for six months in several hospitals, he returned to his beloved Kentucky on crutches after the war ended, and after slowly healing his mind, body and soul, he became a very prominent Nicholas County farmer.

In 1866, Young married Belle Davis, and the couple had five children.

Young died April 3, 1926. He was buried in Carlisle with the flags of

both the United States and Confederate States of America in his hands. Civil War veterans from both sides served as honorary pallbearers such was the magnitude of their respect for this honorable man.

If the Good Lord is willing, dear reader, we will learn more about Lt. Young's exploits during the war in future columns.
